ASQUITH AND LLOYD-GEORGE, LEADING FIGURES IN PARLIAMENT.



The session of parliament summoned by King Edward to meet in historic Westminster Feb. 15 is expected to become memorable in the history of the British empire. Two of its leading figures are Herbert H. Asquith, the premier and leader of the Liberal party, which has been returned to power by a majority of two, and David Lloyd-George, the chancellor of the exchequer and the most prominent man of today in the British empire. The rejection of Lloyd-George's radical budget by the house of lords led to the recent election.

TO GROW ASPARAGUS IN STATE MILWAUKEE CONSTRUCTION WORK

FRUIT GROWERS AT KENNEWICK SECURE 250,000 PLANTS WHICH WILL BE GIVEN TRIAL—PLANT 100 ACRES IN SPRING.

Spokane, March 5.—Fruit growers at Kennewick, on the Columbia river, in Benton county, southwest of Spokane, have obtained 250,000 asparagus plants, which will be set out in a short time, the plan being to produce the vegetable for export by the carload. They believe that asparagus can be grown in commercial quantities at a big profit, and if the venture proves the success predicted for it by experienced truck gardeners, they say that canneries will follow.

They have sufficient plants to spread over more than 100 acres and it is expected the entire district will be interested in the industry within five years. They will grow the vegetables in their newly-set orchards and in connection with small fruits and early vegetables. The Kennewick district is one of the first to have strawberries on the market and many growers have made fortunes there in following that industry.

Census in India Mammoth Task.

Calcutta, March 5.—An Indian census—necessarily the biggest undertaking of its kind on record—is to be taken in March, 1911. Three hundred millions of people of varying races and creeds will be enumerated and the results tabulated—a task which would cause the Washington bureau of statistics to hesitate.

But the Indian civil service has already proved itself equal to the task. It holds the world's record not only for the scale of census operations but for speed with which results are issued. At the last census India's 3,000,000,000 had been counted by midnight on census day and the results were published fifteen days later.

Ephrata Has Truly Gone Dry.

Ephrata, Wash., March 5.—Ephrata has gone dry, not by a vote of the people, but by the aid of the elements.

The chinook caused a flood in the canyon in which is located the source of the water supply, and washed out seven lengths of 12-inch pipe, some of which floated for three miles down the valley. Today being washday and no water in the mains, the housekeepers had to wait until another day. Some people had to carry water one mile.

Death of Superintendent's Boy Secretary.

Everett, Wash., March 5.—The mother and sister of Earl Longcoy, the 19 year old secretary to Superintendent O'Neil, killed in the Wellington avalanche, are mourning here today for the boy they came from Wisconsin to be near and had not seen in many months.

The mother and sister arrived in Everett Sunday morning and were waiting daily for Earl to return from the mountains. Last night the news was broken to them. They will return to Wisconsin again to live.

REPORT SAYS ROUTE FROM THE COYOTE RAPIDS TO NORTH YAKIMA WILL BE CONSTRUCTED THIS FALL.

Ellensburg, March 5.—All the right of way for the Milwaukee road between Beverly and Hanford has been taken up. At least the Hanford right of way has been taken up, and it is understood that it is the only portion the business of which was not closed. J. L. Hewitt, right of way agent of the Milwaukee road, was in North Yakima Saturday and Sunday and then took over all the options of the Hanford property obtained some weeks ago when agents were sent into the field for the purpose.

Mr. Hewitt declined to talk regarding the plans of the Milwaukee road though admitting the specific object of his stop here. Following his visit the statement was made that the Milwaukee proposes to get into this valley this fall. Its North Yakima line will branch off from the Beverly-Hanford line at Coyote Rapids and will come directly across the Moxee and into this valley just south of the city of North Yakima. It is declared that the company proposes to lose no time getting here and after its road is once constructed will begin to straighten it between this city and Beverly to make the Beverly-Portland route, through North Yakima, as direct as possible.

It is hoped that this tangled up business will be settled soon and the whole matter be merged into one good system.

The Lamoine people who have operated a line for some time with connections with the Pacific States at Waterville, have made arrangements to incorporate, not having been incorporated, and Henry Anderson and O. B. Griffith were in own Monday to make arrangements for incorporating the business. The propose to incorporate for \$25 per share.

Attorney Ira Thomas of Wenatchee was here a couple of days the first of the week in the interests of the Wenatchee Farmers' company. He was seeking a franchise from the commissioners to cover the county. A date will be set for hearing at the next session of the commissioners in April when it is hoped they may be successful in securing the sought for franchise.

The Southside people were also in Tuesday seeking a franchise which was granted. They will connect with the Farmers' line at Wenatchee.

There are a half dozen or more independent farmers' lines throughout the county which are all right for a small neighborhood, but when they want to get out they find it inadequate. What is wanted is some system whereby they can be merged into one company doing business throughout the county and connecting with the outside. The phone is a business necessity and it is hoped to get it down to a business basis.—Douglas County Press.
