## NOTES FROM THE LABOR WORLD.

Wireless telegraphers have organized at Cleveland, O.

The new labor temple at Kansas City will be occupied May 1.

Printers at Oklahoma City Okla., have obtained an advance in wages.

The British Trade Union Congress this year will open at Springfield on Sept. 12.

The National Print Cutters' association will hold its annual convention at Buffalo, May 23.

The farmers' organization, the Society of Equity, is growing rapidly throughout North Dakota.

United Brewery Workers at Cincinnati have gained a flat increase of \$2 a week, affecting about 1300 men.

The boiler-makers in the railroad shops at El Paso, Texas, have obtained a wage increase of two cents an hour.

The new headquarters of the International Laundry Workers' Union have recently been established at Troy, New York.

About three-fourths of the industries at Des Moines, Iowa, are asking for increased wages this spring, and prospects are bright for concessions.

A vigorous campaign for union made goods has been started by the local branch of the Women's Union Label League at Pittsburg, Pa.

A bill to have all employees of the city work the eight-hour day has been introduced in the councils at Louisville, Ky. This will most likely become a law.

The Illinois Supreme Court recently declared constitutional the law which prohibits the employment of women in factories and stores over ten hours per day.

Every retail shoe clerk in Oakland, Calif., carries a union card. This makes Oakland the banner union city on the Pacific Coast so far as the retail shoe clerks are concerned.

Calgary, Alberta, carpenters demand an increase from 41 1-9 to 50 cents an hour, and a 9-hour day in summer and an 8-hour day in winter. The painters and lathers also demand increases.

The proposition of calling an international convention of the Iron Molders' Union next September in Milwaukee, is being voted on. It is stated that an international convention costs the locals about \$75,000.

A labor party has recently been organized in Toronto, Ont., and it intends to take an active part in the next municipal campaign, with the expectation of getting a number of candidates from the ranks of labor to municipal offices.

Mr. Fred Bancroft, vice-president of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress for Ontario, has been appointed a member of the Toronto Commission on Technical Education. Mr. Bancroft represented the workmen of Canada at the last convention of the American Federation of Labor.

Jim Barry is back in Chicago and declares that Langford can defeat Jack Johnson.

Jim Burge, the Iron Man, died recently of consumption in Sydney, Australia.

Joe Thomas has arrived in California and started training for his coming battle with Bill Papke.

Packey McFarland and Joe Fletcher, the English welter, will box 15 rounds in London May 2.

Ad Wolgast wants \$20,000 to meet Freddie Welsh. Ad must want to get enough money together to buy a couple of steaks.

During her present engagement in New York Miss Olga Nethersole will give her two thousandth performance of "Sapho."

Evelyn Carleton, the daughter of William Carleton, and a member of "The Follies of 1909" company, has composed the music for a new comedy.

Henry W. Savage has engaged Mr. Lionel Walsh for his original role in "The Florists Shop," to be brought out next season as a musical comedy.

The Shuberts announce that two hundred theatres in New England will book the Shubert attractions through Julius Kahn, head of a circuit of theatres.

Henry E. Dixey has returned to vaudiville in New York in "Over a Welsh Rarebit." Mr. Dixey is supported by a cast of three players, including William Mack.

The Liebler company will soon produce the stage version of Hall Gaine's latest novel, "The White Prophet."
