**To Make Gold; Finds Death.**

New York, May 26.—The fumes from the alchemist's furnace heated to a temperature of four thousand degrees in the world old quest for the secret of turning base metals into gold and silver, were what brought about the death of C. C. Dickinson, the New York banker, according to a remarkable statement of Dr. W. F. Lange, the Scranton physician, in whose laboratory the accident occurred. Lange claims he has discovered the long sought process and says he had interested Dickinson in the proposals for taking up the work on a large scale. "My discovery is one which upsets all scientific theories," said Lange in a statement made public here today. "I have developed the process sought for ages which will revolutionize the world. I have discovered the means of increasing an atom of pure silver by the addition of base metals to 100 times its size and weight and still result in being pure silver of equal if not greater fineness. I did not have money enough to exploit the discovery and I interested Dickinson in it. He came here to witness the transmutation."
