**APPLES IN PITTSBURG**  
W. S. Gehr Purchased Apples Grown in This Valley by Jack Lillis.

W. S. Gehr, who returned Wednesday night from a several weeks' trip east, tells of purchasing Wenatchee grown Winesaps in Pittsburg. He was commissioned by Mrs. Gehr to purchase some apples, and going down the street saw a Greek fruit stand and in which were seen some fine looking apples. He asked the dealer where they were grown and was told that they were Colorado apples.

"The deuce, they are," said Mr. Gehr. "I can tell Wenatchee grown apples all over the world wherever I see them."  
He took the box, turned it around and saw the name of J. Lillis, Wenatchee Valley, on the end of the box.
