## THE PONTIACS WERE MASSACRED

Sensational Ball Game Yesterday—Another Game Today at 4 P. M.

"For ways that are dark and tricks that are vain those Pontiacs sure are peculiar." (Apologies to the poet.) Some of their tricks worked, and some did not, as may be judged from the fact that they got not a single earned run, while the home team had three. However, the difference between the final score of 9 to 5 and the earned runs 3 to 0, was largely a matter of errors and luck.

It was a spectacular game—smashing hits, double plays, stolen bases, close decisions and hot debate. The unexpected was always on tap. For instance, "Hornet" Perry has been a little timid of late about standing up to the plate. Yesterday he almost straddled it and listlessly propped himself up on the bat as though he were about to roll a cigarette. Several fans were yelling very chiding remarks at him to "brace up." The Pontiac pitcher evidently thought there was a good chance to "put one over," he did so. Bing! Quicker than greased lightning up came "Hornet's" bat and the little sphere went sailing out into the field for a three-base hit. Then up came Harry Rush and had the audacity to send the center fielder on another hurried trip to the back fence, making two three-baggers in succession. Those Pontiacs surely did look worried.

But their troubles were not alone due to the unmerciful hitting of the home players. On their bench they were heard discussing the seeming impossibility of solving Brown's curves. He was there with "rings on" yesterday, and those rings may be seen in the struck out column. Heavens, how those Seattle men did smite the air.

Neither team scored in the first inning, and the visitors were runless for four sessions at the bat. But in the second half of the second inning Brown started the joy for the grand stand by a Texas leaguer. He went to third on Ross' single to right field. Pugh fanned and while Sterling was at bat that wicked Brown had the nerve to steal home. This piece of impoliteness so rattled Hilton, the Pontiac catcher, that he muffed and the first score came over.

By the way, remember that catcher Hilton. We'll have some fun with him this week. He was a larger part of the show yesterday. For several innings he had an awful grouch. But the fans good-naturedly "kidded" him and a smile blossomed which did not come off for the rest of the game, except when he got the nose bleed. That he is a game man was evident from the way he stood up to bat while still suffering. He sent out what would have been a nice double had not Ross pulled the ball down out of the sun.

A balloon ascension occurred in the third time up for the locals. It started with Rush's stinging grounder to center. Krumholtz, Brown, Pugh and Stockey all made the rounds, but Stockey was caught at the plate. The session only ended when Thompson, second baseman, made a sensational one-hand pickup of Sterling's hot grounder, retiring the side. Score 0-6.

The game then seemed safely stowed away, but the fans were again subjected to the unexpected. The Pontiacs refused to be licked before the end of the game. In the

fifth and sixth innings the strain was beginning to tell on Brown, and he lost some of his speed. The Puget Sounders took advantage of the opportunity and brought in five tallies. Score 5-6, which is some different.

The visitors then took a new lease of life in the field. The "Terrible Turk," Olag Sorrenson, entered the box, exchanging positions with Hovey. Olag was a wonder. You should see his wind-up. It beats the contortions of an angle worm. But he puzzled the boys for a while. When they did find him—well, it was awful, the things they did to him.

The feature of the eighth inning was Krumholtz' nice work in spoiling an attempted double steal. Running out into the middle of the diamond, he chased the "Terrible Swede" back from third and threw the ball to Perry. The wicked Scandinavian deliberately bumped into "Hornet" with all the force of his thrown body, a nasty piece of business, which knocked the ball out of "Hornet's" hands, but accomplished nothing because the umpire promptly called the runner out.

Pugh did some fine base running in the eighth, causing the pitcher to throw the ball several times to second. The last time was once too many, for it went very wild and the fleet new second baseman ran home. This was the last tally. The rest was easy.

Adams work as umpire was not so good as usual on calling balls and strikes. But he was impartial and probably no umpire could have done better in such a trying game.

In the game this afternoon, Kyle will pitch for the locals. He has not had a fair chance in the box this year and the fans are anticipating some sensational work from him today.

The Pontiacs won their final game from Waterville last Monday, giving them the series.
