BURNING BOAT RUMOR

Chicago People Worried Over Reports of Excursion Party.

Chicago, Aug. 11.—Widespread consternation has prevailed here for three hours, due to the report of a ship afire on Lake Michigan 20 miles northeast of here. Friends and relatives of thousands thought to be on the excursion trip have kept telephones to newspapers, steamship offices and wireless companies busy with inquiries. ***

It has been ascertained that every boat running out of Chicago on the Chicago-Saugatuck line, where the fire was reported, has been accounted for as safe. After three hours of search by Fire Marshal Horn of Chicago he reported that the vessel about which there was so much concern was being brought into the Chicago harbor under her own steam. When the fire tug Graem and the Flora Hill, the steamer in question, arrived, people on the Hill stated that there had been no fire on board the vessel. That craft and both steamers said they had not seen any burning vessel. Whether there is another ship afire somewhere on the lake could not be ascertained. ***

Wilfred Laurier Will Meet Portland Delegation August 29.



HINTS FOR THE BUSY HOUSEWIFE

Folding Clothes Tree That Slides Into Bedpost.



An ingenious form of clothes tree has been designed by a Baltimore inventor. Its advantage is that when not in use it can be folded up and slipped out of sight in an instant. The clothes tree consists of an upright rod or pole with foldable arms at the top. This rod fits into one of the foot posts of the bed and is made with a ball on top so that when it drops into the hollow post of a brass bed the ball on top will form the decoration of the post and the presence of the tree will not be noticed. The chief use of a clothes tree is at night, and during the day it is usually in the way, particularly if the bedroom is small. The device shown here can be drawn up at night and held in position by means of a screw near the top of the bedpost. The arms, which fold up around it to permit its entering the post, can be drawn out to a horizontal position and a handy clothes rack is ready for use. ***

Useful Pointers. Pure alcohol can be used with wonderful success as a means of cleaning black Spanish or chintilly lace. Feathers that have grown grimy can be given a bath in alcohol, after which they are shaken until dry. A weak solution of axolic acid used for stained fingers is good. For minor stains lemon juice is helpful. If brass candlesticks are disfigured with verdigris, try rubbing them off with a cloth dipped in ammonia. When next making fudge add some chopped raisins and nuts to the slrup just before beginning to beat it. A spoonful of ox gall to a gallon of water will set almost any colored fabric if soaked in it before washing. For white spots on the nails a solution of turpentine and myrrh in equal portions is an excellent remedy. ***

DIVER GIVES UP SEARCH

Meets No Success in Effort to Recover Body of Norman Calberg.

Up to noon today the diver searching for the body of Norman Calberg has met with no success. He is making a systematic search of the eddy which is just below where the drowning occurred. He began at the upper end where the water is most shallow and is covering the bottom of the river foot by foot. Within the first hour's work yesterday he recovered the whip which Norman threw away before making a leap from the floating tank. This circumstance gave hope that the body might soon be found. It is now thought that the reward of search will come when the lower end of the eddy is reached. Here the water is deepest and the surface of the river bed rises considerably before joining on to the main bottom, so that an object would have a tendency to remain there. It is estimated that the diver will not reach this portion before evening but that he will have covered the entire eddy bottom before night fall. The eddy is about sixty feet wide and eight hundred feet long. ***

Later.—The search has been completed down to the rapids and the diver has given up all hope of success. He will return to Seattle tonight. There is little chance of recovering the body now until it rises of itself. In water as cold as is the Columbia, fifteen or sixteen days are required before the corpse will rise and float. In warmer water this happens in seven or eight days. Yesterday Will Carlberg and Percy Scheble started out on horseback and will notify all ranchers and other residents along the river between Valhalla and Beverly to keep a faithful watch for the body. They are also sticking up notices that a reward of \$250 is offered to the person discovering the body. The two men are riding together going down on the east side and will return on the west side. ***

Spokane, Aug. 11.—A pretty home wedding was that of Miss Louise Gallup, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Gallup, and Paul McIntyre of Leavenworth, Wash., which took place yesterday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, at the home of the bride's parents, 813 Shannon avenue, the Rev. W. J. Hindley officiating. There were a large number of guests to witness the ceremony, and the rooms were decorated lavishly with the flowers of the season. The bride was dressed charmingly in a pale pink satin gown with quantities of lace. Afterward an elaborate wedding dinner was served. Mr. and Mrs. McIntyre left last night for Leavenworth to live, where Mr. McIntyre has a position with the Great Northern railroad. The bride has been prominent musically in Spokane and in the Hollanders society, where she was musical director. ***

General Traffic Manager of Great Northern Confident.

"There will be plenty of cars to move the fruit and grain of the northwest on the lines of the Great Northern," said W. W. Broughton of St. Paul, general traffic manager of the road, who passed through the city to the coast today. He continued: "At a rough estimate I would say that in Washington alone there will be used between 4,000 and 5,000 cars for the fruit, and from the present outlook there will not be a shortage at any time during the fall.
