ELECTRIC LINES IN NEAR FUTURE

Tacoma, Aug. 17.—That the Pacific Coast will be covered with electric propelled railroads in the not distant future is the opinion of W. W. Broughton, traffic manager of the Great Northern, at St. Paul, who with M. J. Costello, assistant traffic manager, was in Tacoma yesterday. "The electric lines of Oregon and the Inland Empire system, which taps the Palouse country of Eastern Washington, have shown the facilities which such lines afford for passenger traffic and short haul freight," said Mr. Broughton. "There is no reason why all this section should not be covered with electric lines. The power is here to be had from the mountains. All that is needed is the initial expense and

then the juice flows on forever. The building of the plants of concrete and steel make them practically indestructible, and the cost of maintenance is not high. Electric lines are great developers and will do much to solve the traffic problems between cities where power can be easily secured. I do not believe, however, that for trunk line purposes electricity will supplant steam for the present at least. "The rate situation, which at present is complicated by the order of the interstate commerce commission suspending the back haul and other rates, will be adjusted in a few months after the 100 or more clerks now engaged in going over the 4,000,000 way bills covering shipments between New York, Minot, Spokane and other points have completed their work. The back haul rates which were to give Tacoma and Seattle a 25 cent differential against Portland to North Yakima, Ellensburg and other inter-mountain cities will also be settled in the near future."

PRIMARY ELECTION TO COST \$1200

Deputy County Auditor Bases Estimate on 1908 Election Expenses.

The primary election to be held September 13th next will probably cost the taxpayers of Chelan county about \$1200. This is the calculation of Deputy County Auditor Homer Grant. He bases his estimate on the books in the auditor's office. They show that two years ago the primary election expense in this county amounted to about a thousand dollars. It cannot be stated in exact figures for the reason that the cost of both the primary and the general elections is not segregated in some items.

It is to be expected that in some features the election will be more expensive this year than ever before. Not only is the number of voters and polling places increased, but new laws go into effect this year which will cause additional printing. This law calls for change of rotation for the order in which names appear on the ballots. This is to avoid the slightest appearance of partiality, so that the name of every candidate will appear at the head of the list on a portion of the ballots. All this costs money. Deputy Auditor Grant figures that it will bring the total cost up to at least \$1200 for the primary election this year.

Part of this expense will be met by the candidates themselves. There have been 27 of them and their fees amount to \$316. This money has been turned into the current expense fund of the county.
