# IMPROVEMENT IS THOUGHT HE WAS MARVELOUS ROBBER

Sioux City Official Says Wenatchee's Activity is Unparalleled.

B. J. Andrews, of Sioux City, Iowa, is a guest of his former townsman, D. L. Pratt, of the Chelan Butte Orchards company. Mr. Andrews was for several years a member of the city council of his city during which time he acted as president of that body and performed many of the duties of mayor.

The Iowa visitor was interested in looking over the improvement work now under way in this city because he was involved in much of that kind of work in his own city. To a reporter of the World this morning he stated that he has never seen a city of twice the size of Wenatchee in which so much was being accomplished at the same time.

Referring to the difficulties of a city official, Mr. Andrews remarked that the bane of his life has been the misunderstandings in the minds of good fellow citizens which cause them to heap unjust criticism upon the heads of their public servants. Giving a leaf from his own experience, he told of a friend in Sioux City who met him on the street car one day and at once poured out a severe criticism upon the way a certain improvement in one of the additions was being handled. When the true facts were explained, the critic begged his pardon and said his informant had totally misrepresented the case. It is just as common for good officials to be misunderstood and misrepresented as for bad officials to get any foothold.

Mr. Andrews says the commission form of government is now being tried in his home city, but that it is not proving to be a success in all particulars. Personally he would like to see a return to the former system of mayor and council.

### ATTENDANCE PLEASURES

W. A. Ross, Assistant General Passenger Agent, Thanks Daily World for Publicity.

The Daily World was in receipt of a letter today from W. A. Ross, assistant general passenger agent of the Great Northern, in charge of the demonstration train in the state of Washington. He feels very kindly toward Wenatchee people for the attendance last Saturday. Clerk at Ellis-Forde's Will Not Be Careless With Money Hereafter.

During the rush hour yesterday afternoon an episode occurred at Ellis-Forde's which for an hour promised serious developments. Some patrons were in the furniture department making purchases. When they left one of the parties, a young man, picked up a coat which he supposed belonged to his father-in-law, a very respectable rancher of the valley, who had gone on down the stairs. The mistake was not discovered by the country people until they had reached their home, about two miles out of the city.

The coat was the property of Ellsworth McCarle, a clerk in the furniture department. It contained \$158 in cash. He had laid the coat down while waiting on the customers and did not notice its disappearance for a minute. By that time the customers were gone.

A call was sent to the police, and soon Sheriff Ferguson, Chief Inscho and Officer Van Landingham were at the store. C. G. Hall volunteered the use of his auto for a chase of the supposed culprits. Unable to find them, the return was made in a short time. Meanwhile the ranchers had discovered the mistake and phoned in to the store. Within an hour the young man arrived with the coat, which was found to contain every cent of the money.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 22—Rear Admiral Herbert Winslow, whose family name has figured conspicuously in the annals of the United States Navy, was placed on the retired list today on account of age. Admiral Winslow is a son of Captain Winslow, who commanded the Kearsage in its famous victory over the Alabama off the harbor of Cherbourg in the civil war. He was appointed to the navy from Massachusetts in 1865, and reached the grade of rear admiral in May of last year. For some months past he has served as president of the naval general courtmartial at the Boston navy yard. His retirement results in the promotion of Captain John C. Fremont, the commandant of the Boston navy yard, to the rank of rear admiral.
