U. S. TREASURY SUBMITS REPORT

Asks for Currency Reform and Extension of National Banking Laws.

Washington, Dec. 8.—Currency reform; extension of the scope of the national banking laws, in the event of no immediate general changes in the monetary system; civil service retirements, a customs service free from "practical" politics; businesslike methods in the daily transactions of the government and a general abolition of red tape wherever it clogs the wheels of the government's business, are among the recommendations contained in the annual report of Franklin MacVeagh, secretary of the treasury, presented to congress today.

Secretary MacVeagh expresses the hope that the monetary question will come into congress detached from sectional or political considerations.

"We have no system of reserves. Our banking system destroys them. It concentrates in New York what are pretended to be reserves and then forces the New York banks to lend and abolish them. Our system, instead of building up a reserve, destroys it, as fast as it inclines to accumulate."

In connection with his criticism of the money system, one of his most important recommendations concerns future issues of Panama bonds, of which \$290,000,000 were authorized by the tariff act.

HEROISM OF ONE SAVED LIVES

Crew of Schooner Taldodge Had Narrow Escape in a Snowstorm.

Block Island, R. I., Dec. 8.—The heroism of one of the five men who made up the crew of the schooner Taldodge of Noank, Conn., in fighting his way through the surf in a dory after the vessel had been driven ashore in the blinding snowstorm late last night, is all that saved the lives of the others.

The Taldodge struck on Grove point at the northeast end of Block Island.

Realizing that their only escape lay in getting assistance from shore, one of the sailors, whose name is not known, volunteered, and though the wind was blowing a 50-mile gale, he pulled away in a little boat and found the Sandy Point lifesaving station and a crew from that station brought the other men ashore.

U. S. CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION ANNOUNCES EXAMINATIONS FOR FEBRUARY.

The U. S. civil service commission announces that competitive examinations will be held on February 4, 1911, for first grade or clerical, and for third grade or sub-clerical positions in the various field branches of the federal service outside of Washington, D. C., at the following places in the State of Washington: Aberdeen, Bellingham, Centralia, Everett, Pullman, North Yakima, Port Townsend, Vancouver, Walla Walla and Wenatchee.

The first grade or clerical examination is given for the position of clerk, inspector, deputy officer, sampler, and other positions in the custom house service; clerk, officer, deputy collector, storekeeper, gauger in the internal revenue service. The position of office deputy United States marshal and clerical positions requiring similar qualifications in this service and other field branches.

The third grade, or sub-clerical examination is given for the position of attendant, foreman, and night inspector in the custom house service, and for messenger, watchman, classified laborer, skilled laborer and positions requiring similar qualifications in the service and other field branches.

The practice of holding separate examinations for the custom house, internal revenue, etc., has been discontinued and all appointments in this service will be made from the eligible registers resulting from the examinations to be held February 4, 1911.

The minimum age limit for first and third grade examinations is 18 years. There is no maximum age limit.

All persons who desire to compete should at once apply to the local secretary of the board of civil service examiners at any of the offices mentioned, or to the secretary of the Eleventh Civil Service District, Room 224, Federal Building, Seattle, Washington, for application form 1371 for the first grade examination, and form 1800 for the third grade examination.

Applications must be filed with the district secretary at Seattle prior to the hour of closing business on January 2, 1911.
