## CATHOLICS ALTER CHURCH LAWS

Clergy of New York Diocese Hear New Decrees of the Pope.

New York, Dec. 8.—Changes in the ecclesiastical law of the Roman Catholic church as promulgated by Pope Pius were announced to the clergy of the arch-diocese of New York today at the triennial synod at St. Patrick's cathedral. More than six hundred priests attended.

The most important decree is the "maxima cura," decided upon by the consistory congregation at Rome, which takes from the bishop or archbishop of a diocese or archdiocese, respectively, the power to remove a pastor. Hereafter the power of removal will rest with the "de amotione parochi," which consists of six priests

besides the archbishop. Reasons for the removal of a pastor have been decided on by the consistory congregation at Rome as follows: "Perpetual insanity; such unfitness or ignorance as renders him incapable of performing his duties; permanent physical or mental infirmities; the animosity of the people when it renders his work useless, and is likely to continue; loss of reputation; a hidden crime; gross neglect continued after warning and disobedience to the bishops if continued after one or two warnings." Another change announced is that pertaining to the age at which children receive their first communion. Heretofore it has been the custom among priests in the English-speaking countries not to administer the sacrament until a child is between the ages of 10 and 12. The decree issued makes it imperative for the priests, the world over, to prepare the children so they may receive the first sacrament upon attaining the age of reason, which is seven and in some cases six.

## ORIENT WANTS OUR FLOUR

United States Ships Large Amount to Hong Kong and Japan.

Seattle, Wash., Dec. 8.—Evidence of the continued demand for American flour in the far east is indicated in the shipments of breadstuffs from Puget Sound during November. The exports for the month aggregated approximately 110,000 barrels, compared with shipments of close to 100,000 barrels during the previous month.

Nearly 60,000 barrels of flour shipped from Puget Sound was sent to Hong Kong, and more than 12,000 barrels went to Japan, until two months ago a poor market for American flour.

wheat has enabled Puget Sound millers to sell more flour in the far east than at any time since 1907, when the oriental flour trade was at its height. It is stated that millers have more export flour orders on their books than at any time in years.

Rev. M. L. Sanders Will Hold Evangelistic Services, Beginning January 8.

Rev. M. L. Sanders, pastor of the Methodist church, announces that revival services will begin in his church on the 8th of next month. No evangelist has been secured. The pastor himself will have entire charge of the meetings. It is uncertain how long these services will continue. They may run a month or even more. Rev. Sanders has had considerable experience in evangelistic work and he is looking forward with anticipation to a successful meeting next month.

## BARN BURNED IN CASHMERE

Property of J. E. McClimans Goes Up in Smoke — Loss \$2,500.

About 8 o'clock last night the Cashmere Livery Stable, belonging to J. E. McClimans was discovered on fire and despite the heroic efforts of the Cashmere fire department, the building went up in smoke.

The rigs and horses were saved but the barn with a considerable quantity of feed, burned, entailing a loss of about \$2,500. For a time it looked as though the adjoining property would burn, but the fire department prevented the flames from spreading.

## BIG BOATS COLLIDE

Crew and Passengers Took to Boats — But One Reported.

Yarmouth, Eng., Dec. 8.—The steamer Blackburn Grimby, for Antwerp, was sunk in a collision with the steamer Rock off of Sheringham. The 23 passengers and Blackburn's crew of 27 took to three small boats. One boat containing 24 persons reached here today. The remaining two boats have not reported.

## CAMPAIGNS COSTLY TEACHERS' EXAMS

Two Committees Filed Expense Accounts Today With Proper Officials.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 8.—The republican congressional committee received \$77,461 and disbursed \$74,373, while the democratic congressional committee received \$27,790 and disbursed \$27,771 during the recent campaign, according to reports filed today with the clerk of the house of representatives.
