PORTLAND HOPES TO WIN GAME

Expect to Wallop Oak Park On Next Saturday Afternoon.

Portland, Ore., Dec. 29.—Despite the crushing defeat administered to the Wenatchee high school team at Seattle Monday afternoon by the Oak Park high school team of Chicago, Washington high school here is confident of winning when they meet Saturday afternoon at Recreation park.

According to Seattle reports Oak Park "unfolded play after play that had never before been seen on a western gridiron." The local high school champion team is also prepared to unfold plays that have never been seen before in Portland.
