MOST CRIMINALS UNDER 30

Oldest Convict is 73, but One of 87 Was Recently Released.

Olympia, Wash., Dec. 30.—Some interesting statistics regarding the ages of criminals have been compiled by the state board of control in its biennial report to Governor Hay. It is shown that in the state penitentiary there are 78 convicts under the age of 20 and 483 between the ages of 20 and 30, making a total of 561 who are under the age of 30 years. This is more than double the number between the ages of 30 and 40 years as 238 come in that class. As men grow older they grow better, or else they are discharged from the prison, for there are only 79 in jail between 40 and 50 years old. They grow still better in the decade between 50 and 60, as there are only 31 committed who are under the age of 60 and more than 50 years old. Those who have passed the three-score year mark and get in trouble number only 18 and there is only one prisoner at Walla Walla who has passed the allotted space of three score years and 10. He is 73 years of age. One man, 87 years old, was received during the past biennium, but he was later released. These figures show that the charge frequently made that most of the dangerous criminals are young ones is true, at least this record bears out the statement frequently made that it is men under the age of 30 years who commit more crimes than any other. The fact that 78 inmates of the penitentiary are under 20 years of age shows that the youth of Washington as a certain percentage are decidedly bad. There are 247 inmates between the ages of 20 and 25 years.

Majority Are Intemperate.

Another striking feature of the report is that of the 901 inmates of the state penitentiary 736 are classed as intemperate, 182 as temperate and 3 are moderate. Just what is meant by moderate is not defined and that definition would prove most interesting if someone attempted to make it clear to the average layman.

It is also shown that of the inmates 366 pleaded not guilty when arraigned in court, while 535, or more than 80 per cent., admitted their guilt.

It has often been contended that single men are more likely to get into trouble than married men and this report of the state penitentiary bears this out. Of the inmates 699 are single men, 141 married, 22 have been divorced and 39 are widowers. This would indicate that the married men have too many troubles of their own to get busy breaking laws.

Many Are Orphans.

It is also shown in the report that 319 of the inmates are orphans, 219 have both parents, 123 have fathers who are dead, while in 45 instances it is not known whether the parents are alive or dead.

Comparatively few prisoners return for the second term, or at least few of them are in the jail at the present time, as out of the 901 prisoners 820 are serving their first term, 62 are in for the second time, 12 are third timers and one bears the distinction of having been sent back for the fourth time.

In Washington more Protestants than Catholics seem to get into trouble, as the report of the state board of control shows that 547 Protestants are in the prison while 313 Catholics have been committed. The Mormons have managed to get along without being represented, while 9 heathen are in jail. The atheists are also law abiders or else there are none of them in the state to amount to anything, while 23 profess no religion.
