RUSSIAN STATEMENT. In East Prussia the Germans have been driven back on the line from Neidenburg to Soldau.
In Poland the Germans were successful in getting a footing on the lower Buzza, north of Sochaczew.
Further to the south they reached the Rawka river at Bolimo and they have passed Skiermiewice, moving to the east. Austro-German forces are moving in to Poland along a front which runs from a point southeast of Tloczkow to the west of the river Nida, in Galicia. They have reached the river Dunajek and they occupy a line from Grybow to Smigrod and Sanok.
The effort as a sort of a Przemysl garrison resulted in complete failure.
GERMAN STATEMENT. BERLIN, via wireless to London, Dec. 23.—The official statement issued today by German headquarters says: "Attacks in the region of Lombaerz and to the south of Bixchoote have been easily repulsed by us. At Lrurichebourg L'Arroue, the English again were driven from their positions yesterday. Notwithstanding desperate counter attacks we have retained all positions which we captured on the English on the Lrurichebourg canal from Airo to LaBassoe. Since December 20 750 British and colored soldiers have been captured by us and five machine guns and four mine throwers were taken. In the neighborhood of Camp Challoons the enemy is showing increased activity. Attacks to the north of Fillerie, southeast of Rheims, at Souain and at Perthes have been partly repelled by us with heavy losses to the French. The situation in East and West Prussia is unchanged. Battles for the possession of the trenches of the Buzza river, west of Warsaw, continue. The situation on the right bank of the Pilica remains unchanged.

River Falls. The cold wave that we are now passing through has caused a fall in the river. All of the smaller streams that were swollen are now normal.
