SPORTOGRAPHY—By "GRAVY."

Jim Flynn, man of many monikers, is 35 today. With thirteen years of ring fighting in his rearward path of life, Jim Flynn will celebrate his thirty-fifth birthday today. Although there are a number of old-timers of the belt game who occasionally essay to come back, Jim is about the oldest man regularly engaged in the practice of his profession. Jack Johnson is a little older than the man who made Pueblo famous, but the big black who deprived Flynn of his championship aspirations at Las Vegas in 1912 hasn't been doing much scrapping since that event.

Jim's real name, nationally and family history are enshrouded in mystery, as a police court reporter would put it. Both Brooklyn and Hoboken have been given credit for being Jim's native birthplace. He has been referred to as German, German-Irish, Irish and Italian, and his real name is given as Andrew Haymes by some authorities, and as Andrew Chariglione by others, and as Andrew Chariglione by others.

According to the most various testimony, Jim was born in Brooklyn on December 24, 1879. His father, said to have been an Italian, was named Haymes, and his mother was also an Italian. It is fair to surmise that Jim is an Italian, and his mother married an Italian named Chariglione and removed to Pueblo. Jim's pugnacious youth was spent in the Colorado city, where he was commonly known as Andrew Chariglione. In his boyhood

days he was the cock of the walk in Pueblo, and no kid was too big for him to tackle. Occasionally he came in for a drubbing, but it didn't discourage him in the least.

In those days the future pugilist was noted as a football player, and anybody that got in his way was due to be flattened out. Jim was twenty-one before it occurred to him that, whereas he had always fought for fun, he might earn money with his fists. His early professional bouts were staged by a Pueblo club, and Jim wasn't always as victorious as his records would seem to indicate. After several battles in Pueblo, he was matched in 1902 with Jack Lavell, at Otto Plot's Colorado A. C. in Denver. On that occasion Jim fought as "Young Gallagher," in honor of "Red Pat" Gallagher, a famous middleweight of those days, who afterward quit the ring and made a fortune in Denver dirt. Jim emerged from that rousing slightly battered and the worse for wear, and decided that the fighting game wasn't so soft after all.

It was in the immediate subsequent period that Jim gained the name of "The Fighting Fireman." He got a job as stoker on the Rio Grande railway, and for some time was a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, and left the fight game alone. The fighting blood was in his veins, however, and he soon made another start in the ring game at Salt Lake City. This time he was more successful, and since then he has fought some of the best of the middleweights. In 1907 he fought his first engagement with Jack Johnson, at San Francisco, but the darky was too clever for him, and Jim—for by this time he had adopted the ring name of Jim Flynn—scarcely put a glove on Johnson in the eleven rounds the fight lasted before Jack stopped Jim's misery with a knockout.

Flynn has also been knocked out by Sam Langford, Luther McCarty and Gunboat Smith, and not long ago was outpulsed by Carl Morris. It is apparent that Jim's best fighting days are over, but he is still a mighty useful institution in putting new "hopes" to the acid test. Jim never was and never will be champion, but any man who can whip the Pueblo fireman has a chance.

TODAY IN PUGILISTIC ANNALS

1886—Soldier (Alfred) Kearns, born in Brooklyn. The Soldier, who looked for a time like one of the most promising of white hopes, failed to live up to what was expected of him, as he was knocked out by Jess Willard and outpointed by Battling Levinsky. He started out in life to be a blacksmith, but tired of that job, and entered the army. He was the star athlete of a cavalry regiment in the Philippines, and as a plain and fancy rider he took part in a number of army tournaments. Then he took up boxing, and won all his fights with clean knockouts. After leaving the service of Uncle Sam he entered the ring. His first battle was with Jim Stewart, and that veteran had had quite enough of the soldier's game when the police stopped the fray. After that Kearns knocked out many good men, but he wasn't quite good enough to last.

Age Seventeen Dies in the Chair

TRENTON, N. J., Dec. 24.—Stephano Ruggieri, seventeen, the youngest convict ever condemned to death in the New Jersey State Prison here, was electrocuted for the murder of Pasquale Fulgarano at Lyons Station in May last.

The boy died calmly. He bade everybody goodbye before he was strapped in the electric chair.

The Rev. Edward A. Griffin, of St. Joachim's Catholic Church, this city, administered the last sacraments and prayed with the prisoner on the walk to the chair. Edward A. Curry, executioner at the Charlestown (Mass.) Penitentiary, was in charge of the killing. A photograph to be sent to the father of Ruggieri was taken.

Five other men who are to die next month sang hymns at the death march began. Ruggieri claimed he was employed by an uncle to kill an enemy of the letter and fired a shot that slew Fulgarano.

Weston Man Has Fractured Skull

CLARKSBURG, W. Va., Dec. 24.—An operation at the hospital developed that Roland Henning of Weston, and his skull fractured when he was attacked and hit over the head with a powerful blunt instrument by one of three men in Weston, Monday night.
