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FAIRVIEW.

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OIL NEWS.

The West Virginia fields are furnishing the best producers and most of these are located in the Weir sand development in Kanawha county. The search for new producing territory in the southwest counties has been almost abandoned.

Worked On Itself.

On Long Bottom, in Cabin Creek district, Kanawha county, the Producers' Production Company, of Columbus, Ohio, has drilled in a wildcat on the Williams Coal Company's property that is reported to have started at 15 barrels a day when drilled into the Bersa grit and later drilled itself in, increasing its production to 75 barrels a day. The location of the well is about 20 miles from the Blue Creek field. It's well is located in a section not easy of access and is situated in a district that has not hitherto been tested. Additional information as to the status of the strike is awaited with considerable interest. The discovery of a new pool at this time would arouse interest in the eastern fields. The producing formation from which the oil is derived is probably the same as that on Blue Creek and designated the Weir sand.

Lot Doing in Harrison.

Harrison county continues to lead in development work. The completions of the week were pumbers and the greater part of them located in Sardis and Union districts. The wells are moderate in size as compared with the completions of the early part of the year. At that time the producing area of the pool in Sardis district was expanding, but now the producing limits are defined and the completions are located in the interior. There is a little experimental work under way and starting.

More About Harrison.

On Brown's creek, Grant district, Harrison county, the Clarksburg Light & Heat Company is down 2,500 feet at a second test on the Geo. Rogers farm. On West Fork river, the West Virginia Central Gas Company is due in the Big Injun sand at a test on the Chapman G. Smith farm, located in Grant district. On

West Fork river, Clay district, Sheffner & Co. have drilled their test on the Heffling heirs' farm into the 50-foot sand and have a light gasser. On Lambert's run, Engle district, the Hope National Gas Company has one of the same kind at its test on the C. W. Swiger farm. On the same stream, the same company is drilling a test on the W. H. Lyons farm, and on Shinn run, in Clay district, has started to drill a test on the T. S. Lang farm.

Roone and Other Counties.

On Laurel Fork, Smithfield district, Roane county, the Wayland Oil and Gas Company has completed and shot its No. 3 on the J. W. F. Kelly farm and has a fair gasser, spraying a little oil. On O'Brien's creek, Center district, Gilmer county, Kingsley and Enslow have started to drill a test on the Rollyson farm. On the same stream and in the same district, Alexander & Doty have made the location for a test on the J. W. Smith farm. On the right fork of Steer creek, in the same district, Howard & Co. have started to drill on the J. W. Twyman farm and H. M. Turner and C. Frame have the rig completed for a test on the J. W. Frame farm. On Upper Camp creek, Union district, Clay county, Joshua Davis and Co. are due in the sand at a test on the James Craig farm. On Elk river, Union district, Clay county, the Samples' Oil Company has started to drill a test on the B. W. Samples farm.


