### PYTHIAN LODGES SHOW BIG GAINS

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Aug. 28.—The annual meeting of the Grand Lodge West Virginia Knights of Pythias and the Grand Temple of Pythian Sisters, will be held here, Wednesday and Thursday, August 30 and 31. Arrangements are being completed for the entertainment of several hundred members of the orders.

Headquarters for the Grand Lodge will be established in the Hotel Frederick and the sessions will be in the auditorium, while the Grand Temple will have its headquarters and hold its sessions in the Huntington hotel.

The rank of page will be exemplified by Glendine team of Charleston on Wednesday evening, and the parade will take place Thursday afternoon. A ceremonial session, known as "DOKK" will be held Thursday evening in the Hippodrome theater.

Reports of the officers will disclose that during the fiscal year ended June 30 last, West Virginia lodges have gained 1,686 members, bringing the total membership to 22,027. Eleven new lodges were instituted. According to a statement by the Grand Keeper of Records and Seal the West Virginia Grand Lodge leads in Pythian Knighthood. For the post biennial term its gain in new members was 4,688, with Pennsylvania ranking second and Ohio third.
