PITTSBURGH, Oct. 24.—The dealings on the local market were conducted on a much broader scale than has been customary of late, but this broadness was unfortunately produced by the infusion into the market of old, resurrected mining issues, a feature that is looked upon with much grave concern by many of the brokers, who hold to the opinion that the business in such issues is bound to reflect unfavorably sooner or later upon the trading in the regular list.

On the regular list the oil and gas issues were the most active, and in this market Pure Oil filled the leading role, although it did not improve on the day's transactions. Lone Star Gas made an advance of 1/4 points, but this fact lost its significance, as the sale was only a small one.

Grain and Produce.

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—World crop shortage estimated at 25 per cent., as compared with the yield in 1915, sent wheat prices higher and higher, as much as times as 5/4c a bushel. The close was unsettled at \$1.74 1/2 for December and \$1.74 1/2 for May, with the market as a whole showing gains of 1/4c to 4/8c net. Other leading staples, too, all scored an advance—corn, 1/4c to 2/8c, oats, 2c to 2 1/2c and provisions 1/4c to 1/10.

Oil and Gas.

Wildcat wells are of more than passing interest at this time. Operators are extremely anxious for new producing territory and it does not take a gusher to attract attention. Small producers in a new locality are interesting as well. On the Little Kanawha river, Sherman district, Calhoun county, W. Va., the Hope Natural Gas company has drilled its second test on the G. Rice farm through the Big Injun sand and it shows for a 10-barrel pumper.

On Blue Creek, Elk district, Kanawha county, the South Penn Oil company drilled a test on the O. T. Thomas farm through the Weir sand and it is showing for a 25-barrel producer in that formation. On the same stream, the United Fuel Gas company gave its No. 2 on the Nancy E. Myers farm a shot and it responded with a production of 35 barrels the ensuing 24 hours.

In the Big Injun sand development west of Pine Grove, Greene district, Wetzel county, the Wildwood Oil company has a duster in the Big Injun sand at No. 8 on the S. L. Morgan farm. Dixon & Pyles had the same kind of luck at a test on the George Cross farm. On Fish creek, Church district, the Carnegie Natural Gas company's test on the J. N. Curry farm is a gasser. On Sugar creek, Clay district, the same company has drilled a

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—Developments over the week-end were deemed sufficiently favorable by the speculative element to bring about further appreciable advances in today's active market, with new high records for United States Steel and other favorites which have contributed so extensively to the almost steady rise of the last few weeks.

Last Saturday's bark statement which showed a liberal expansion of local cash holdings and a corresponding contraction of loans—the greater monetary ease reported from principal reserve centers, material tonnage gains by leading railway systems and unabated demand for products and commodities helped to accelerate yesterday's upward movement.

Steel's rise of 2 1/2 points to the new record of 121 1/2, at which it passed its preferred stock for the first time in the company's history, was again attended by an enormous turn-over, no less than 330,000 shares changing hands out of a total of 1,270,000. Profit taking served to give Steel and other leaders in the industrial division a moderate setback toward the close, but this was counterbalanced by greater strength in high-grade rails.
