### LONG NORMAL GAME ENDS IN TIE SCORE

#### Fairmont and California Teams Well Matched in Saturday Game.

Fairmont Normal held California Normal to a 7-7 tie score Saturday in a long, argumentative, and at times, brilliant game. Normal scored a touchdown in the first three minutes by steady rushes down the field. Ridgely carrying the ball across and Reed kicking goal. After this surprise California straightened up and held the locals. Normal was deprived of an additional touchdown, when because of gathering darkness, the referee did not see all of a forward pass play and Normal's pass to Ridgely, going across the line, was decreed incomplete.

Mills was the worker on the California eleven, tearing through the Normal line for fairly steady gains. Ridgely, for Normal, played possibly the best game of his life, but with the exception of Mike Hamilton and Reed, had little support. The Normal line could not keep up with California's shifts and time and again were demoralized when the visitors charged.

California would have fared better had they had a coach who knew the rules for playing football. At times his ignorance of the game caused even boys to howl derisively. At one time California attempted a forward pass, which was broken up by Ridgely. The coach began dancing up and down and shouting, "Fifteen yard there Mr. Referee, for interfering with a forward pass." The joke being that he actually meant it.

The coach, however, showed some appreciation of the game by commenting on Ridgely. "He's some football player and the only one on your team."
