CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—Exiles from love, bondsmen of ambition, two lovely young girls, Josephine and Marie Kryl, 17 and 16 years of age, live in a velvet-draped, picture-decorated "prison" here in the heart of Chicago and peer out at the world of love and romance. Joy and adventure as it sweeps past them in this gay city.
Chicago plays and dances, cabarets and lightfooted, but Josephine and Marie, both light of heart and light of foot, never go to a dance, have never been to a movie or cabaret.
Neither of them has ever had a sweetheart—they have not yet learned to lip the language of love.
Their father, Prof. Bohumir Kryl,

man of wealth, patron of art and director of an orchestra, wants his daughters to be great musicians. He says they cannot be both great musicians and lovers too. And so he placed them in seclusion.
He took them from the public schools and from their dolls when Josephine was ten and Marie nine. He made them subjects of one of the most daring experiments ever undertaken by artist or scientist in the realm of human emotion.
"The world needs great artists," says Prof. Kryl. "Let the commonplace woman attend to the loving and the marrying, the bickerings and the divorce, and the frivolity that so often goes with romantic love."
When Josephine is 31 and Marie is 30 they will be returned to the world with the intellect of mature women and the emotional experience of children.
But will cupid laugh at the locksmith and steal Papa Kryl's treasures from him before their exile is finished?
"I wouldn't have beaux around the

house interfering with my daughters' music lessons," says Prof. Kryl.
"We have the company of Chopin, Beethoven and Schubert."
"Why should girls listen to the sissy-boy bleating his calf love when they can play the immortal music with which Tristan wooed Isolde."
"My daughters study Corot and Breton instead of Charley Chaplin and Mary Pickford. They never read the newspapers. Stories of society scandal would fill their heads with foolish notions."
"Even when we go on tour I keep them in seclusion as much as possible. I do not want them to know men."
"When they have finished their musical education they may go and play. If they marry I will say 'God bless you.' I will be happy if they do not marry."
"I don't quite understand what papa means about love," says Josephine, a pupil of Ysaye and violinist of rare talent.
"I have never known any boys since I was 10 years of age."

"The only men I know are the beloved master Ysaye, Kubelik and Benlike that."
"They have wives and lots of children. I wouldn't fall in love with them. They are not young nor beautiful."
"I could only love a man who was fine and handsome as Romeo or Tristan were."
"I love music and I love the pictures here—but sometimes, oh sometimes, Marie and I feel so lonely!"
"And anyway, chirped Marie, "Papa loved and married."

INDUSTRIAL FAIRMONT

Next spring when you smack your lips over a gorgeous looking strawberry shortcake, and your mouth waters at the sight of a dish of "strawberry's an' cream," it is hardly probably that you will thank the Marion Planting company for that luscious feast, but you should.

"Sawdust makes a dandy mulch for the berry vines during the winter," said a strawberry farmer the other day as his wagon was backed up to the sawdust pile and his two boys were busy shoveling the dust into his wagon.

"I hear lots of my neighbors saying that it's a good mulch for young fruit trees and other plants needing mulching," he added.
