ALMOST FORGOT THE DEFENDANT

Lawyer Get a Wrangling and Client Was Almost Left Unheard.

Legal battles raged for more than two hours yesterday afternoon before Justice Conway when Lonek Boltek, an Austrian, was tried on a charge of violating the Yost law by owning certain whiskey that was brought into the state. So much contradictory evidence was given in the case that Justice Conway wanted the night to pass before he gave his decision in the case.

At noon today Justice Conway decided to sentence Boltek to work on the county roads for two months. A fine of \$100 was also imposed. Bekkie several weeks ago gave bond to appear before the grand jury. Attorney L. C. Musgrave represented Bekkie and Attorney French McCray was counsel for Boltek. The case was bitterly contested and the attorneys clashed frequently and there was plenty of goat-getting during the trial. In the excitement that bristled a serious oversight was only remedied at the last moment by the justice's order—that of putting Boltek on the stand to testify in his own defense. Even at times one of the lawyers got so excited that he used "naughty words."






