For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1913. This year we omitted the statement of assets and liabilities for the reason that we have not been able to obtain an auditor to prepare the same. The statement with reference to the General Fund shows the revenues and expense by departments for the year and also gives the amounts expended in general improvement accounts and retiring of bonds. In the Water Fund it will be found that the revenues for the year, while an increase over past years, has not been sufficient to meet the expense incurred in operation and improvements of ordinary kinds. This is due to the increased cost of labor, material and fuel. We particularly call attention to the item for the pump station, shown in the statement in analysis. The value of the coal consumed being \$20,290.95 which is three times what it formerly has been. The total revenues from the water department are not sufficient to make necessary additions and carry on the system as will be seen by inspection. In this statement no deduction has been made for depreciation as has been done in former years. In accounting for it a still further deficit would be shown. Beginning July first, however, the new rates went into effect and, of course, we will have a very considerable increase in revenue for the current year. The statement with reference to the Bond Fund shows the items of income and disbursement and condition as of June 30, 1913, the end of the past fiscal year. All of which is respectfully submitted. J.
