New York

NEW YORK, May 27.—Yesterday's stock market session was marked by extraordinary activity, scope and strength. Sales amounted to 2,025,000 shares, making the first two-billion-day since February 1, 1917.

Foremost among these were the influence of the signing of the peace treaty, the heavy over-subscription to the Victory loan, continuance of excellent crop prospects and further relaxation of the money market conditions.

Pittsburgh

PITTSBURGH, May 27.—On the Pittsburgh stock exchange the sales total up 41,328 shares of stocks and 19,265 bonds. The price movement was somewhat irregular, but the great majority of the net changes represented gains.

Westinghouse Electric had the benefit of the showing made in the annual report, and advanced to 59, the highest of the year, on sales of 1,151 shares, while the preferred at 70 was \$3 a share above the last previous sale.

Oil and Gas.

With few exceptions light wells are the rule at the beginning of the week of development work in the Eastern fields. The best producer is the Dunn Station Oil and Gas Company's No. 8 on the Hutchinson heirs' farm, located in Richhill township, Greene county, Pa.

In Springhill township, Cochran and Funk have drilled No. 4 on the Strope heirs' farm through all sands. It will be good for five barrels a day in the fourth sand. The Manufacturers' Light and Heat Company has completed its test on the Jonathan Wycoff farm to a depth of 2,265 feet. It is a duster. In the Washington district, Washington county, the same company's No. 1 on the John and C. A. Reed farm produced 95 barrels the past 24 hours.

In the old Glade Run field, Butler County, the American Natural Gas Company has completed a test on the Glimperly farm. It is a good gasser in the fourth sand. In the Zellenope district, Youngblood & Co. have a third sand gasser at a test on the J. T. Wise farm.

In Lafayette district, Pleasant county, G. A. Smith & Co., have completed the test on the A. J. Transmitter farm. It is showing for a two or three-barrel pumper in the Big Injun sand. Nothing was developed in the Maxon o. Keener sands. This location is 150 feet north of the Walnut Run Oil Company's test on the L. C. Watson farm.

The Richter Oil Company's No. 16 on the M. Richter farm, located in Burning Springs district, Wirt county, is a two barrel pumper in the salt sand. In McKim district, Pleasant county, David Ruby & Co's test on the David Ruby farm is an eight barrel pumper in the salt sand. In the same district and county, E. M. Hall & Co., are drilling in the Big Injun sand on the Meredith Nichols farm.

In Clay district, Ritchie county, the Hope Natural Gas Company's test on the C. E. Cunningham farm is being tested in the Big Injun sand. The Silver Hill Oil Company's No. 6 on the C. S. Headley farm, located in Greene district, Weasel county, is holding up at 25 barrels a day. In the same district the Hope Natural Gas Company's test on the B. F. Fox farm is a gasser in the Big Injun sand. The same com-

pany is testing in the Big Injun sand No. 1 on the C. Amos Long farm.

On Barnes Run, Spencer district, Roane county, Godfrey L. Cabot has completed No. 12 on the Jennings tract. It is a fair gasser, located 1000 feet southeast of No. 4 on the J. T. Williams farm. In the same district the United Fuel Gas Company's test on the Kenney-Kirk farm is a duster in the Green grit. On Elk Fork, Curtis district, the Ohio Fuel Oil Company has started to drill another test on the Thomas Allen farm.

In McElroy district, Tyler county the Manufacturers' Light and Heat Company's test on the William and Mary Brown farm is down 2200 feet and fishing. In Grant district, Ritchie county, Nay & Kintzer are drilling on the A. L. Spencer farm. In Clay district the Riverside Oil Company is due in the sand on the Drummond-Dodd farm. In the same district, Clark Riggs & Co., have started to drill on the Guy Westfall farm. Stealey Collins and Co., are rigging up on the D. Jones lot. A Fisher & Co. are rigging up a test on the L. P. Wolf farm.
