Maxwell and Chalmers Representatives Gather at Hotel Fairmont.

Predicting that Maxwells and Chalmers 1920 models of automobiles would be manufactured within the next few months with less interruption than recently, M. C. Manship, Detroit, supervisor of the company, delivered an interesting address last evening before 45 dealers, Maxwell users and friends of The Hall Garage Company at Hotel Fairmont. At some length Mr. Manship told of the series of strikes that had crippled Detroit within the past few months. This strike trouble affected body plants, the foundry and other departments so that the production was crippled, men unacquainted with the work being unable to make perfect castings and this necessitated discarding the greater portion that were produced. He predicted that deliveries in Chalmers would be made by July 15 and the Maxwell would be produced at the rate of from 75 to 80 per cent of normal production during July. He stated that a district office would be opened in Cleveland and that West Virginia would come under the jurisdiction of that office. In the way of formally opening the affair, Attorney M. W. Ogden, president of the Hall Garage Company, very cleverly traced the locomotion of man on the basis of the Darwinian theory. First he used two feet instead of four then he clung to a club and later he discovered a wheel would facilitate travel. Then came the vehicle and last the auto and "it's here to stay" added Mr. Ogden. The flying machine is here, but it will never be as practical for transportation as the auto, and will never replace it. Mayor Anthony Bowen delivered the address of welcome and he made a very breezy talk in which he foretold how thousands and thousands of tourists would visit West Virginia if it possessed better roads. West Virginia, "The Switzerland of America," is scenery that cannot be surpassed he contended. He assigned California's great development to the fact that it has built good roads. Rev. W. D. Reed suggested that the auto company compile a publication to be known as Maxwell courtesies. Every Maxwell driver should be urged to be cautious so that it might be said that no Maxwell owner has violated traffic regulations; been in a wreck or has been a "road hog," that is, taking more than one half of the highway. T. Luther Cordray manager of the Hall Garage Company, urged the dealers to remain on their heels so that when the production reaches top notch speed and cars are turned out more freely that they can be sold without delay. He said the auto business was brighter now than any time in its history. H. N. Thomas, the service representative of the Chalmers car, discussed the "hot spot" manifold and told how it puts the punch in gasoline, which has become very inferior in the last few years. Other speakers were M. L. Brown, Dr. G. R. Miller, Esquire, Attorney Herbert Morris, Harry E. Engle recited a poem and engaged in story telling. An excellent menu was served during the evening.
