

LATE DEVELOPMENTS IN THE LOCAL SPORT WORLD

MONONGAH GLASS TEAM LEADING IN FIELDING

Tom Ashcraft Retains His Title As Best Hitter in the City League—Other Interesting Statistical Information.

Tom Ashcraft continues to lead the City League in individual batting honors. The Watson Building star has been to bat just 55 times and has connected for a total of 26 hits for an average of .472.

Charlie Burns, the big Monongah Glass short stop, is batting .546, but has been to bat only 22 times, less than half the number of times Ashcraft has handled the stick. Herbert Barnes, of the West Virginian, is following closely behind Ashcraft, 34 hitting honors, having a percentage of .462.

The Watson Building team continues to hold the hitting honors, although the Monongah Glass has gained a few points on them in recent games. The B. & O. continues to hold third place although they have dropped away down in their percentage of hits.

The club fielding records show the Monongah Glass the best fielding team in the league, having 38 errors in 475 chances for an average of .920. The Watson Building has increased its fielding strength in recent games and is now tied with the Mining Machinery for second place in club fielding.

Shanasky, of the Wholesaler team, continues to lead the City League in base stealing, having just 14 bases to his credit. Jacobs, of the Watson Building comes second with 12 stolen bases and Garrett, of the Owens tribe, with 11 thefts.


