The last thing Sol told us was that new seat covers had been bought, and would be one of the things that would give the house the look of the real theatre. The curtains for the back of the orchestra pit are also waiting for the decorators. Davis and Shear are also authority for the statement that when the curtain goes up Monday afternoon, it will be as noiselessly as the passing of a shadow. Now, if we had the company, we might go up in the front row and sleep without being rudely awakened. The piano got all tuned up this week too, in honor of the approaching opening event, which Sol didn't tell us, but everyone on this end of Adams street is aware of just the same. The painters are well along with the work on the theatre interior, and the entrance is now the object of attack from the clean-up gang, with a good showing already made. Whether Russell Henrici has already worked himself to the edge of nervous prostration and gone to Atlantic City, or whether he is fearful that he might, we are unable to find out. Anyhow, he is fighting the surf by this time, instead of green paint, stove polish and gold tinting, and no doubt finds it much more pleasant. Word has been received from the booking agency that the first vaudeville artists are showing in Toledo this week, and giving great satisfaction.

Italian Characters in This Feature. In the five-reel picture, "The Tiger Lilly," at the Princess, Margarita Fisher is cast in the role of Carmina, a pretty Italian girl. The story contains many Italian characters and centers about an inn conducted by the girl's uncle in America. Near the inn is the home of a wealthy American, Philip Remington, who has married an Italian woman, and the course of events plunge the story into the entanglements of a vendetta which originated in Italy years before.

The tale is an interesting one, but moves too slowly at the beginning, and is rather obvious in plot. This renders certain dramatic moments less thrilling than they would otherwise be, since the spectator is able to anticipate much of what is coming.

The settings are pleasing throughout and in keeping with the story. The scenes in the first reel, picturing the life led by Carmina at the inn, are full of atmosphere, and the Italian types are good. Margarita Fisher appears to advantage in her role, and E. Alyn Warren makes the most of his sanguinary part as Giovanni.

One of the best touches in this production is the scene in which Carmina induces the organ grinder, Antonio, to sing his old aria from Pagliacci. The settings in and about the Remington home are in pleasing contrast with those taken at the inn.

Dutch Character for Mary. Mary Pickford has been starred upon the screen in characterizations in many

picturesque nationalities, but her little Dutch girl in "Hulda From Holland," which will be displayed at the Nelson theatre today, has never been surpassed in humor and genuine appeal.

Although there is a great deal of tender appeal in Miss Pickford's little Dutch girl, there is much that is comical in her interpretation of the role, and there are many little delightful episodes in which three adorable children are seen with the star, that has made the production rank as one of Miss Pickford's greatest contributions to motion picture humor.

Miss Pickford is finely supported in this production. John Bowers, her leading man, plays the part of an artist, while Frank Losee, one of the best known screen players in the country, is seen as the cold, calculating business man. Russell Bassett also has a good part. The three little boys are well cast.

Adventure and Romance. There is little but adventure and romance in the first of the Charles Miller specials which is showing at the Dixie today. "A Dangerous Affair" is the title of the story which well describes the whole affair. A Harold Lloyd comedy is the extra reel.

ARRESTS FOLLOW RIOT AT MINE

Body of Mrs. Fannie Sellin's Will Be Buried at Chicago.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 28.—One arrest was made yesterday in connection with the strike riot which cost two lives in Brackenridge Tuesday, and it was predicted that 20 or more others will be taken into custody.

Joseph Murray, aged 48, employed by a local private detective agency as a guard at the mine of the Allegheny Coal and Coke company, where the rioting occurred, was arrested on a warrant issued by Justice of the Peace Thomas E. Conway, of Hites. Murray is alleged to have been one of the guards who fired into the crowd of strikers.

Mrs. Fannie Sellin, of New Kensington, an organizer of the United Mine Workers of America, was killed when the strikers were fired upon by the guards. Joseph Strasecki, an alleged strike breaker, was killed by bullets alleged to have been fired by the strikers. A number of others were injured in the melee.

Quiet prevailed in the strike zone yesterday. Deputy sheriffs sent out to reinforce the mine guards were patrolling the district, but few of the strikers were about.

Chief Deputy Coroner Harry T. Ewing announced he had received information that the mine guards did not fire a shot until a shot fired by one of the strikers had struck the motorman of a train of coal cars just leaving the mine. Deputy Coroner Joseph Borland is investigating every angle of the shooting.

The body of Mrs. Sellin will be shipped to Chicago, her former home, today for burial. Mrs. Sellin had been a resident of New Kensington for the past five years, in which time she took prominent part in coal and trolley strikes in the lower Allegheny valley.
