An enthusiastic audience which filled the Grand clear to the exits last night laughed and applauded and then laughed and applauded more as they sat and enjoyed the big John Cort musical comedy show, "Listen Lester." It was a splendid affair, not over-advertised in the least. The orchestra was augmented by the addition of five musicians from the company, which with the local musicians handled the scores in excellent shape. The song numbers were all of the light and cheering kind, the soloists however, presenting no marked capability, although every number was handled to the satisfaction of the auditors judging from the hearty applause that punctuated the performance at frequent intervals. The dance numbers were more in evidence as was the talent in this direction. The very clever work of Juno Roberts was the most enjoyable part of the performance. She has a sweet winning personality, really good voice, and is grace itself in every dance number with which she favored us. The lead parts, those of the hotel clerk Arabus, tralling the man who wrote her ten thousand dollars worth of love letters, Lester the clerk, Colonel Dodge, Mrs. Mumm who wouldn't keep that way, all were clever folks, and continually provoked good humor with the well delivered lines of the story, itself a nice bit of comedy, well plotted. The production is staged in a gorgeous manner, stage settings and costumes being both novel and beautiful. They were a fit environment for the chorus which was good to look upon, danced delightfully, and generally added to the attractiveness of the production.

Western Drama for Dixie. The Universal Six-part Special Attraction, "The Sleeping Lion," at the Dixie, is a production that stands easily on its own merits. It is rich in human interest and has plenty of stirring action such as is characteristic of the best type of Western dramas. The story interest is strong, with the ensnaring influence of child life uppermost. Monroe Salisbury, in the role of a kindhearted Italian potter wins the sympathy of the spectator in the beginning, and holds it to the end. His portrayal of the Italian role is excellent.

Howard Hickman, whose work as a screen villain never fails to compel admiration, sustains his reputation in the role of the town gambler and head of an unscrupulous gang. His associates, composed of well-chosen types, are impersonated by players of ability. The Western, and especially the saloon atmosphere, is good.
