

MEXICAN REBELS KILL FOUR IN TRAIN FIGHT

Military Guard Returns Fire and Kills Many Rebels

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Oct. 30.—A band of fifty or sixty rebels under command of General Guzman, who recently left the Carranza army and joined the revolutionary forces of General Almazan, several days ago attacked a passenger train on the Monterey and Gulf railroad killing four passengers and wounding a number of others, according to a dispatch from Laredo today. The Carranza military guard detained and returned the fire of the bandits and killed several of them.

Death Toll is Large in Big Train Wreck

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 30.—Six dead and about 120 persons injured, some seriously, was the casualty as the result of a wreck of the Southern Pacific, San Joaquin Valley Flyer train yesterday. The tangled mass of wreck was expected to reveal additional bodies. No official investigation of the wreck had been arranged early today but railroad officials said it was caused by the engineer trying to make too much speed on a ten degree curve.

Steel Men Returning to Work in Chicago

CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—Minor rioting in the vicinity of the steel plants and the return to work of fifteen hundred men at the Standard Steel Car Company mills at Hammond, Indiana, were the chief developments reported today in the strike of steel workers in the Chicago district. In a three cornered fight among approximately sixty five negroes employed at the south Chicago steel mills strikers and policemen in which more than 200 shots were fired no one was injured. Four negroes were arrested.

Frank Coogle's Corn Husked by Friends

Frank Coogle's neighbors have husked his corn. Mr. Coogle, who is one of the best known and most popular East Fairmont men, is in Johns Hopkins hospital in Baltimore, for treatment. He has a shock of corn in his field. This morning at 5 o'clock a small army of his friends appeared on the scene and 45 minutes later the fodder was all nicely shocked and the yellow ears were safely in the crib. Mr. Coogle's brothers were very grateful for this display of friendship. Speaking of it this morning one of them said: "There were about 30 men in the field and many came to do their bit that were just in time to see the last shock finished, but not too late for the thanks extended. This was a sample of the community interest existing in the Second ward."
