MORGANTOWN, Nov. 26.—Nothing can prevent a heavy, wet field being provided for the meeting of the gridiron gladiators from Washington and Jefferson and West Virginia University here tomorrow afternoon. Tuesday morning dawned cold and clear and the local weather prognosticators were enthusiastic in their predictions for an ideal dry day. The gasoline was made ready for further drying out the field and everything was lovely.

Then there was a sudden change. The biting air changed to a warm humid one and within an hour a down-pour that completely engulfed the University field descended. It continued for hours and it is still raining this morning. The result is that the field is soggy and heavy for inches under its surface and in places there are small pools of water though the system of drainage installed in the last few weeks has prevented the deluge creating a miniature lake from the field as had been the case a month ago.

Gasoline was to be invoked again today and this may aid in drying up the worst of the places but all conceivable efforts could not prevent a regular quagmire as a site for the contest.

### How to Find Your Seats at the Big Game

## W.&J. STARTS FOR GAME WITH W.V.U.

### Squad of Twenty Two Men Made Trip in Six Automobiles.

WASHINGTON, Pa. November 26.—The advance guard of Washington & Jefferson's football party got away at 8 o'clock this morning for Morgantown, W. Va., where tomorrow afternoon the Presidents engage the Mountaineers in the final game of the season—a contest that looms large as one of the most important of the year in the country. Twenty-two players were in the six automobiles that carried the squad to field and he feels that there will be nothing but the most serious effort. The party left Hays Hall, college being scheduled to arrive at the West Virginia college town about noon. Six more players will leave here tomorrow morning with other members of the W. & J. party. The entire squad could not be secured for more than 25 persons, so great is the demand for hotel rooms. The 22 men taking the trip in charge of Manager John H. Murdoch and Head Coach David C. He did not even stage a blackboard drill last night and will content himself with giving the men a light limbering up workout on University Field Morgantown, this afternoon.

Not a man is showing any injury of a serious nature and the first string varsity that played against Syracuse and West Virginia Wesleyan will be able to start against the Mountaineers tomorrow afternoon. Tomorrow night a special will leave Morgantown at 7 o'clock arriving at Brownsville at 8:15 o'clock and enabling the local adherents to get home by 9 o'clock. The W. & J. team will be quartered at the Madria hotel, Morgantown, where headquarters for the Presidents will be maintained on Thanksgiving Day.

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
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
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
