"I gave way to the will of the billboys because I could not think of an argument on the spur of the moment which would meet their demands," declared George Nelson, manager of the theatre. "It was set forth that the end of the world was expected on Wednesday and the conclusion drawn that in such event the distribution of the heralds would be unnecessary work performed in weather which was anything but desirable. It was argued that there was plenty of time to distribute the heralds starting on Thursday; that there could be no loss by acceding to the demands of the billboys and that in the event of the prediction coming true he would be working on cold days would be an unpleasant termination of the earthly career of those engaged for this work. It was no strike. There was no quarrel as to wages or hours. The workers simply requested that certain work be postponed and I acceded to the demand."
