

BULLSTAKECHARGE IN STOCK MARKET

Issues That Have Been Under Bear Pressure Have Rebounded.

NEW YORK, March 16.—Pools resumed their bullish operations in the stock market, notably among speculative shares.

Demand loans opened and renewed at 9 per cent holding at that rate throughout the session, against last week's final quotation of 15 per cent, despite the strain imposed on bank reserves by heavy tax payments.

Greatest gains among stocks were registered by issues recently under bear pressure and by others in which preparations for declaration of stock dividends are reported to be in progress.

Extreme advances of 2 to 15 points were subjected to wide fluctuations in the last hour on word from Washington that a resolution had been introduced in the house against distribution of stock dividends.

Crucible Steel and Central Motors maintained their reputations as the sensational features of the market. Crucible finished at a gain of 4 points after having risen 14, while General Motors forfeited more than half of its 8 1/2 point advance.

Other steels, United States Steel excepted, and many of the motors, and their allied specialties also petroleum equipments, shippings and food stocks closed at gains of substantial proportions, but rails were inclined to lag throughout. Sales amounted to 1,650,000 shares.

PITTSBURGH, March 16.—On the Pittsburgh Stock Exchange trading was lighter and the oils were firmer. Arkansas Gas sold as high as 32 1/2, buyer's option 15 days, and closed at 31 1/2, regular delivery, an advance of 1/2 over Saturday's close. Barnsdall sold at 48 1/2, an advance of 1/2, on the favorable annual report, but closed at 46 1/2, 48 1/2 asked, the wide spread measuring the uncertainty as to the effect of the 40,000 shares class "B" stock, par \$25, which is offered for subscription at \$25 a share. Guffey Oil declined to 20 1/2, and recovered to 31, and Oklahoma Gas declined from 42 to 41 1/2, Pittsburgh Oil and Gas closed 1/2 lower at 15 1/2. Marland Refining was fairly active, 2,010 shares selling at the uniform price of 6 1/2. Union Natural Gas was 1/2 lower at 12 1/2.

National Fireproofing common closed 1/2 higher at 8 and the preferred 1/2 higher at 15 on the optimistic forecast contained in the annual report. Vitrified Products was also 1/2 higher at 15. There were no dealings in Air Brake or Electric on the local board. Pittsburgh-Jerome Copper was traded in to the extent of 28,600 shares within the range of 9c to 12c, closing at 10c, and 1,500 shares San Toy changed hands at 6c to 7c. Liberty bonds were moderately active and firmer.

Grain and Produce

CHICAGO, March 16.—Soaring prices in the corn market resulted chiefly from assertions that Eastern railroads had been notified to furnish Chicago grain shippers with 3,000 cars. There was a buoyant close. Oats gained and in the provisions the outcome was unchanged to 12c lower. Bulls were strongly of the opinion that enlarged shipments to the East would cause a decided reduction in the corn supply here and that the stock of feeding stuff East was very limited. Liverpool cables telling of a resumption of trading in corn futures were also construed as favoring an advance.

German developments had a depressing effect at the start, but afterward were ignored. Prospective big shipments East made oats ascend with corn. Lower quotations on hogs kept the provisions market weak.
