Large crowds greeted the opening performance of "Scarlet Days" at the Nelson yesterday and everyone went away well pleased with it. It is a story of California in the days of '49. It is not at all complicated, although it has several important characters, and there were two sets of happy young lovers riding bravely forward to meet the future. Rosy Nell, the inmate of a dance hall in one of the smaller towns of California, is startled to learn that her daughter has arrived from Boston. The girl has no suspicion that her mother is not a respectable woman, and fortune throws her into the hands of three men who are touched by her youth and innocence, and she is taken to the cabin of two of her new found friends on the edge of the town. The mother, who has killed one of her companions at the dance hall for robbing her of money which was to take her back to her child and respectability, has been condemned to be hung, but is granted three days in which to visit her daughter. From this point on the story tells of the efforts of the dance hall keeper to get hold of the young girl and of the fight made in her defense by her new champions. One of these men is a desperado named Alvarez, most picturesquely played by Richard Barthelmess. Other fine impersonations are those of Clarine Seymour, Eugenie Besserer and Carol Dempster.

The problem presented in the "Eyes of Youth" is one that daily confronts many of us—whether to sacrifice one's ambitions and be content with the results, or to take the road that appears most inviting. The young lady in "Eyes of Youth" is permitted to gaze into a crystal and see her life as it will be five years ahead in the different things that she has in mind to do. It shows her as a school teacher, staying at home and helping her family; it shows what the results will be if she follows the path of her ambition, that of being a singer, showing the many pitfalls that she will meet with on the way, and lastly she is shown what her life will be if she marries the man of her father's choice, who is very rich, but who is only infatuated with her for the moment. After seeing all this it is very easy for her to decide to marry the young fellow of her own choice, even though he is not a millionaire, and settle down to domestic life and happiness.

Grand Duchess Makes Appeal

Grand Duchess Olga Alexandrina, sister of the former Czar of Russia, has cabled the National Lutheran Council for aid of refugee Russians in Serbia. The cablegram comes from Belgrade where the grand duchess is in exile at present. The cablegram reads: "Having met Professor Morehead and heard from him of the relief work his commission has done and is doing in various countries of Europe I can only hope that this good work can be extended to Russian refugees in Serbia and elsewhere. May I also express with all my heart the hope after these trying years that the Christians of America may at the earliest practicable moment come to the aid of my suffering countrymen in Russia?"

With the cablegram from the former Czar's sister comes a cabled report from Dr. J. A. Morehead on conditions and needs in southeastern Europe. The report says that the need of relief and church reconstruction in the Balkans is enormous. All social life is disorganized. The political conditions are uncertain. Church life has practically come to a standstill. In many cases the church has to be rebuilt from the very beginning as whole villages have been disintegrated and scattered.
