Big Parade Will Feature League Opening

Final Plans Arranged at Big Meeting

Managers and Executive Committee in Session at "Y" Last Night.

Managers and directors of the seven baseball clubs in the Fairmont Industrial Baseball league met with the executive committee last night at the Y. M. C. A. and discussed plans for the opening game which will be staged Saturday afternoon at 2:30 between the Monongah Glass company and Harvey's West Virginians. A big parade will be held Saturday afternoon just before time to go to the ball park. All the teams in the league will be in uniform and take part in the pageant. The parade will form at the West Virginian building at the head of Main street at 1:30, and go out Fairmont avenue to the ball park. Mayor Conway will pitch the ball from the pitcher's box, while J. M. Hartley will be invited to toss the ball out to the Mayor, previous to his winding up to shoot one over the plate. The high school drum corps will be on duty for the parade and at the ball park and will make things interesting.

An umpire from Clarksburg will handle the games on Saturday. Mining Machine and B. & O. playing the second section of a twin bill. It is possible that a semi-pro umpire from Pittsburgh will be brought here and kept all season to conduct the games. Sandy Toothman and L. G. Boggs, representing the West Virginian team, were perfectly satisfied to have Phil Grimes conduct the game between the Glass and the Glass plant, but the Monongah Glass men felt that it wouldn't be fair to Phil to ask him to work a game in which the Glassies played.

After a long and woody wrangle it was decided that each team could name one man within 10 days after the opening of the season and that he would be eligible to play at once without waiting the regulation 30 days. But this is the only exception, and all other new players must wait 30 days if they are not on the job May 15.

If the baseball game is played in the league are as snappy and brisk as the arguments last night between various managers there should be some lively ball games.

It was tentatively decided that the evening games would start at six o'clock, and the fact that no provision had been made in Fairmont for daylight saving as many other cities have was deplored.

All the teams reported good prospects for the season and it is expected that the race will be a hot one.

SOME CHANGES FOR VARSITY

Shakeup Likely in Order to Increase Hitting of Shelton's Men.

MORGANTOWN, May 12.—In an effort to improve the hitting strength of the Mountaineer baseball team it is possible that Kemp Shelton, the West Virginia coach, will inject at least one and possibly two new players into the Varsity lineup and the team takes the field against Washington and Jefferson college here Thursday afternoon in the first of the two-game series between these teams. It is no secret that Shelton was displeased with the hitting of most, that one of his regulars on the eastern trip and that he even considered sending for another player while the team was in New York.

The practices here Monday and Tuesday gave further indication of Shelton's thoughts in the matter as he had "Widmyr" scale in a long drill on the fine points of covering the bases, taking throws, etc., at shortstop and second base, and used Widmyr in the outfield. Jim Mayfield is another outfielder who is being strongly considered for a position. Mayfield is a natural hitter and covers a lot of ground in the outfield and while it would surprise the majority of fans to see him started in the regular lineup against W. & J. in preference to such men as Dorsey, Neffien and Widmyr and Neale, the move is entirely probable. While Neale has been drilled at shortstop, it is not likely that Lytle will be supplanted unless he goes badly against W. & J. In the final games of the trip east Lytle played really great baseball in the field and his hitting for the season is above the average for the whole line.

W. & J. will be a tough opponent for Shelton's team. West Virginia, of course, will have her full strength to send against the Presidents with either Lemley or Woods to call upon for mound duty the first day and it must be said that the team is better organized than the right now than at any time this year. This is not natural, of course, or the eastern trip was the greatest conditioning experience possible and with the middle of the season at hand Shelton's team may be expected to exhibit its true worth in the games of the next two weeks.

Washington and Jefferson is the big east drawing card West Virginia can secure on her baseball schedule. Even last year when W. & J. did not have a regular team and merely picked up a team to meet West Virginia alone, W. & J. drew twice as many fans to the athletic field as turned out to witness any other engagement of the spring, and the same will certainly be true Thursday and Friday when W. & J. comes here with a nine that is reckoned as being strong enough to give West Virginia a real battle.

The Thursday game will begin at 2:30, but on Friday "play" will be called at 2:30 p. m. in order to allow the W. & J. team to get to State College, Pa., for its engagement with Penn State on Saturday. There has been considerable confusion regarding the dates, many fans believing that since Friday and Saturday were the usual dates for games here, that the same procedure would be followed with W. & J., but the Presidents had already scheduled the State contest for Saturday and could not rearrange her schedule.


