

## GETTING FARMERS TO JOIN FARM BUREAU

Plan to Secure a Thousand Members in County This Week.

The Marion County Farm Bureau yesterday on a week's work of education among the Marion county farmers as to what the Farm Bureau is and what it ought to be. This work will be wound up by Saturday night. By that time the decision will have been made whether this county is to have a strong, active Farm Bureau, which can accomplish the things which should be accomplished for agriculture in this county.

At one of the meetings last night every farmer present joined the farm bureau and at the other meetings there were numbers who joined. The dues are \$3 a year, or \$4.50 until December 31, 1921, of which 50 cents goes to the American Farm Bureau Federation, 75c to the State Farm Bureau Federation, \$1.50 goes to the County Farm Bureau, and the remaining 25c out of the \$3 stays in the local club fund in each district.

It would be surprising indeed if Marion county should fail to reach her quota of 1,000 members. The state already has 15,000 members and this number should be greatly increased during the coming summer. Some of the western states have more than 100,000 membership with dues of \$10, \$20 and even higher amounts yearly. Randolph county set out several months ago and considerably passed the 1,000 mark in membership. This county should certainly not stop below the thousand member mark. The Farm Bureau is the organiza-

tion that can help most to bring about better farming conditions and to make life in the country more livable. Both farm men and women can belong. A good idea of the misunderstanding that exists about the Farm Bureau is shown by the remark last night of one farmer, who said he could not belong to the Farm Bureau because he belonged to a labor union. Nothing is farther from the truth. No man is debarred from membership in the farm bureau so long as he is anxious to help promote agriculture and agricultural life and to help his neighbors to live better and make more money. The county agent's work is also much misunderstood as was recently shown by a local banker who, when the county agent went out with him to inspect his farm in this county, asked him what his fee was. This shows that a great many people do not know that the county agent, who is made possible by the county farm bureau, gives his advice on agricultural matters entirely without charge.

Hundreds of dollars are saved yearly to farm bureau members by buying cooperatively. Upshur county farm bureau bought 53 cars of lime last year and saved several thousand dollars. This county here even with its small membership and small fees has saved enough for the farmers of Marion county on the purchase of fertilizer alone to more than pay the salary of the county agent. The volume of fertilizer business all over the state in 1919 amounted to more than 60,000

tons, which, if bought through the state farm bureau means a saving to state farming of from \$160,000 to \$200,000 on this item alone.
