

**M. V. T. DIRECTORS REELECT OFFICERS**

**Unused Track in Mannington Will be Taken Up Soon.**

At a meeting of the directors of the Monongahela Valley Traction company held yesterday, the following officers were reelected: George M. Alexander, vice president; Smith Hood, vice president; Walton Miller, secretary and treasurer; S. E. Miller, assistant secretary and treasurer; A. K. Bowles, Baltimore, assistant secretary and treasurer; H. B. Long, assistant treasurer.

The usual dividend on preferred stock was declared and the authorization made for the drilling of three new wells in the local field. At the meeting were J. O. Watson, J. E. Watson, M. L. Hutchinson, George T. Watson, Walton Miller and George M. Alexander.

In the Mannington section an engineer of the Traction company conferred yesterday with the Mannington city officials in regard to the removal of the tracks of the company on East Market and Main streets, no traffic going over this route for several years. When the new terminal at Mannington is finished, the tracks on Market street between the B. & O. crossing and the Clarksburg street bridge will likely also be taken up.

**First American Savings Bank.**  
The first savings bank of America was opened in Boston Dec. 13, 1818. In the same year an institution called the Philadelphia Savings Fund society was established. The third institution of this kind in America was founded in New York in 1819. The first regular savings bank was established in Hamburg, Germany, in 1778, and the second at Bern, Switzerland, 116 years ago. The first regular savings bank in Great Britain was opened in Edinburgh 105 years ago.

Some partitions will have to be removed at the B. & O. station and it is reported that after that time the stations will be put back on their owners.

John Donachie, Grafton, assistant chief clerk to C. W. Van Horn, superintendent of the Monongah division, it is said, will take charge of the B. & O. station temporarily until the agent is chosen. T. D. Connell will continue as agent of the Monongahela freight station.




