Brown Sugar For Canning

We have been fortunate in securing a fair sized shipment of Brown Sugar, which we will sell as long as it lasts, 20 pounds to a customer, at 29c. We are passing this sugar on to the public at less than 2c per pound for handling. The sugar situation is clearing up to some extent—that is, shipments are coming in more frequently. This we think is due to two reasons. One is that the Attorney General of the United States has recently fixed a limit of 1c per pound profit to the wholesale dealers and 2c to the retailer. This will, of course, cause many of the big speculators who have undoubtedly cornered a large part of the sugar supply to turn it loose, as they cannot expect to reap a bigger harvest by holding it without taking chances of being heavily fined, and the heavy fines being assessed, against the sugar profiteers is having a very salutary effect upon those whose greed for profit has caused them to lose all interest in the public welfare.

Another relief has been afforded by the purchase by the government of a large amount of Argentina sugar, which will be allotted to the canning and preserving interests, thus relieving to a considerable extent the pressure upon the market for sugar for domestic use. We feel that the present price of sugar is unjustifiable, but with the prospect of a continuation of the present freight embargo and the bad conditions of shipping generally, we would suggest that those who want to anticipate their sugar needs for canning will do well to take advantage of this sugar at the present price.

GRANULATED SUGAR
We will continue to sell our present supply of granulated sugar, as long as it lasts, 2 pounds to a customer at 30c per pound.
