

## MAY FORM KIWANIS CLUB IN FAIRMONT

Believed That There is a Field Here for Such an Organization.

Whether or not Fairmont wants a Kiwanis club will be determined in the next day or two. Prominent men of the city are being interviewed yesterday and today regarding the proposition and it is likely that a meeting will be called for the Chamber of Commerce rooms at which preliminary organization will either be effected or the plan abandoned.

The Kiwanis club is similar to the Rotary, excepting that Rotarians cannot belong. Kiwanis is an Indian word meaning "We Build." The Kiwanis organization was originated by the same man who founded Rotary. The clubs sometimes invade each other where there is no Rotary organization but are generally welcomed with open arms where there is Rotary organization. The Kiwanis clubs often meet with the Rotary clubs for occasional dinners.

It is felt that there is a need for a Kiwanis club at Fairmont because of the limits of Rotary. There are not sufficient classifications for all of the men in Fairmont who would make good Rotarians to get into Rotary. C. H. Lincoln, field representative of the Kiwanis, was welcomed in Fairmont by Rotarians and spoke at the Thursday luncheon. He came seeking J. E. Watson, Jr., president of the Rotary, and with letters from Charleston and Wheeling to Major Earl H. Smith and Postmaster Clyde S. Holt.

West Virginia forms a district in Kiwanis circle. H. R. Slapp, of Charleston, is district governor. J. G. Hearne, of Wheeling, is lieutenant governor. The executive committee consists of James H. Beas, of Wheeling, L. J. Corbly, of Huntington, and Hugh Stewart, of Charleston.


**Home from Convention.**

## Water Commissioner Buys Four Fountains

J. Clyde Morris, City Water Commissioner has purchased for the city two drinking fountains and two horse fountains. These will be placed on the streets of the city when they arrive.

The drinking fountains are of the latest design. When a person wants a drink he must press on a foot pedal which turns on the water. When through drinking the foot pedal is released and the water is turned off. The pipes are drained after each person, thus there is always water of a fairly cool temperature in the pipes.

The horse fountains are sort of spigots operated by a foot pedal. Every driver must have his own bucket for there is no trough. This

should help prevent the spread of disease among horses.
