


OUTMAN WAS PROMINENT

Principal Colebank Was Secretary of Educational Conference.

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., July 10.—The eighteenth annual educational conference under the auspices of the Summer school of West Virginia, which ended its two day session here this afternoon, was attended by several hundred teachers and prominent educators from all over the state. Dr. Frank B. Trotter, president of West Virginia University, presided at the conference and George H. Colebank, of Fairmont, was chosen secretary of the meeting. The leader was Dr. George Ellis Jones, of the University of Pittsburgh. The subject under consideration was the broad topic of "Vocational Guidance," which is among the most important questions that has been receiving the attention of school men in recent years. It was considered in detail by a number of speakers, including George H. Colebank, principal of the Fairmont High school; J. Frank Marsh, secretary of the State Board of Education; W. W. Trent, superintendent of Elkins schools; George M. Ford, superintendent of the Dunbar schools; A. T. Starbuck, superintendent of the Shiloh schools; S. C. Gross, superintendent of the Parsons schools; J. T. West, principal Morgantown High school; T. W. Haught, dean of West Virginia Wesleyan College; S. O. Bond, president Salem College; M. J. Abbey, University of Montana; Dr. J. N. Deahl, West Virginia University; E. B. Reuter, Goucher College; and H. W. Pigott, principal Grant High school.
