SAN FRANCISCO, May 11.—Robert Turner, 21 year old boxer, was reported today dying at a hospital from a basic fracture of the skull suffered in the fourth round of a bout with William Hickman, billed as Al McCoy, before the Madison Club here last night. Turner was badly battered in the first three rounds of the fight and was floored three times.
