ANOTHER STEEL MERGER ANNOUNCED

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, May 29.—An agreement to merge has been reached by officials of the Electric Alloy Steel Co. of Youngstown and the Atlas Crucible Steel Co. of Dunkirk, N. Y., and will be submitted to the board of directors of the companies this week. It was announced here today by L. J. Campbell, president of the Electric Alloy, and A. Hunter, president of the Atlas Co. Mr. Hunter, who is a resident of Buffalo, will be president of the new company, and Mr. Campbell, who is the son of James A. Campbell, president of the Youngstown Sheet & Tube Co., will be chairman of the board.

The new corporation will have the second largest production of high speed steel in the country. Each concern has about \$2,000,000 of common stock, and the two together have about \$5,000,000 preferred stock.
