TWO FOUND GUILTY OF POLLUTING RIVER

BUCKHANNON, July 18.—The Buckhannon Chemical Co. of Alexander, William McDade, manager, and Joseph Larkey, superintendent, were each fined \$100 and McDade and Larkey were sentenced to forty-five days in the Upshur County jail by Magistrate John B. Neff of this city late yesterday on the charge of having permitted chemicals to escape into the Buckhannon River last Tuesday and Wednesday, as a result of which thousands of fish in that stream were killed.

The case is the most important one that has arisen since the new Game and Fish Commission went into office, and has been watched with great interest by sportsmen throughout the state. The court room was packed when the trial opened at the early hour of 7 o'clock, and remained so until it was ended late in the day.

The defense made application for an appeal of the case to the Circuit Court of Upshur County, and if the appeal is granted, the case will be heard by the court in September. Various branches of Wild Life League have informed members of the commission that they will back the commission to the limit in the matter.

It is very likely that the Buckhannon Chemical Co. case will have an important bearing on pollution of streams throughout the state.

TROOPS RUSHED TO SUPPORT OF CHEN

AMOY, China, July 18.—Li Hou-Chi, Tsuchung of Fukien province and ardent in his support of Chen Chung-ming and his administration, is proceeding south from Changchow in the Kwangtung with 3,000 troops. Other troops under his control are preparing to follow.

Reports received here state that General Wu Pei-Fu is rushing south through Kiangsi with troops to reinforce Chen in the conflict near Canton.

Gun boats, heavily loaded with ammunition for Chen Chung-ming, have arrived here.

DR. SUN WELL PROTECTED

CANTON, July 18.—(By The Associated Press.)—The cruiser Wing Fung, lying in the harbor off the city with Dr. Sun Yat Sen, deposed president of South China aboard, is protected with barbed wire charged with electricity in preparation for any surprise attack from the forces where Chang Ming's forces are in control.

Reports from north, where opposing detachments are in contact near Shikawan, say that fighting continues on a small scale with Chen's forces gaining ground.

REFUSE TO ATTEND

THE HAGUE, July 18.—(By The Associated Press.)—The Russian delegates refused to attend today's meeting of the joint sub-commission on private property. Instead they sent a letter to the conference saying they would attend a meeting of the whole conference or a meeting of the chairman of the three sub-commissions, but would not deal separately with any single sub-commission.
