SOUTH SIDE TO PLAY GIANTS AT TRACTION PARK

Monongah Will Clash With Ida May at Blackshere Park in the Afternoon.

There will be plenty of excitement for local baseball fans tomorrow. The South Side Independents will meet the Fairmont Giants for the first time this season at Traction Park, and the Ida May team will play the Monongah Glass at Blackshere Park. Both of these games are scheduled for 3:30, and it's pretty hard to say which will be attended by the largest local gathering.

Chuck Trader will do the hurling for Monongah Glass, while Al or Keefe will pitch for the Ida May club.

Local people who attend the game will leave here on the 2 o'clock Mannington car. This will allow them plenty of time to get on the field before the game starts.

The Fairmont Elks will battle the Monongah Glass baseball team this afternoon at South Side Park for the city championship. These two ball clubs are rated as the best independent teams in the city and the game this afternoon will be witnessed by a large following from each team.

Sam White pitched remarkable ball for the Baptists, striking out ten batters and four innings before allowing the Diamond street boys a single hit.



SISLER HOLDING LEAD OVER COBB

Babe Ruth Trailing After Five Others for Home Run Honors of Season.

CHICAGO, July 22.—(By The Associated Press.)—Perhaps Tyrus Raymond Cobb is convinced, in his own mind, that he is "slowing up" after seventeen years as a star in the American League, but George Sisler of St. Louis is positive that the Georgia peach would be his most dangerous rival for the 1922 batting championship.

The race between Cobb and Sisler had narrow down to a difference of only eleven points, with Sisler setting the pace with an average of .416, according to averages released today and including games of Wednesday. Cobb brought his average to .405.

Sisler, however, is showing his worth in base stealing and scoring, having registered seventy-nine times and stolen thirty-four bases. In the winter, his purpose was to sail from Shanghai and steer a course along the coast of Korea through the Straits of Hakodate and then follow the northern route across the Pacific stopping possibly at the Aleutian Islands to Canada if he believed he could complete the voyage and arrive at Victoria in the latter part of August.

"I'm carrying no cargo and no passengers," Captain Waard said, "and it isn't going to be a pleasure trip exactly, for I expect we will meet rough going." At the age of 39 Captain Waard dates his sea experience back to the time when he was a boy of eleven when he says he first put out on a sealing vessel from Victoria. He is of Dutch parentage, but was taken to Canada in his infancy by his parents.

Captain Waard's experience in China extends over a decade several years of which he was skipper of a Chinese coaster operated by a large British export house out of Hongkong. More recently he has been engaged in supervising the construction of a pier for an American Trading concern.

The Amoy, which was the subject of no little press notice in Shanghai is sixty-eight feet overall with a beam of eighteen feet and is modelled on the lines of a typical Chinese fishing junk. Aside from sails and sweeps it has no other motive power. Captain Waard said his ship acted splendidly on its trip to Shanghai from Amoy.

IDA MAY LOSES TO WAYNESBURG IN NINTH INNING

Beveridge Gets Two Singles, Doubles and Home Run for Local Contingent.

Ida May threatened to break the winning streak of the fast Waynesburg team yesterday afternoon when the fast local contingent met the highly-touted Pennsylvanians on their home grounds and maintained a lead until the last half of the final frame. Waynesburg has won fourteen straight victories, and when the Ida May nine tallied two runs in the first inning, the Pennsylvanians got a real scare.

In the opening of the first inning, Sims was walked. Ridgeley sacrificed, Beveridge followed with a home run for the locals, giving Ida May a lead of two runs. In the second inning, Waynesburg was able to score a lone run, and the last half of the ninth found Ida May on the long end of a 2 to 1 score. A home run by Fisher for Waynesburg, however, completely turned the tables and the locals were nosed out of a victory with two men out when the winning run was scored.

Beveridge was unquestionably the best bet of the Ida May lads, getting two singles, a double and a home run in four times at the bat. Waynesburg and Ida May will meet again this afternoon on the former's ground, and a close contest is expected.


