Peculiar Case. What is considered to be a rather peculiar turn of affairs is the case of Ray Amos, one of the prominent citizens of Rivesville. During the past two weeks he has been confined to his room, and on Tuesday morning was thought to be in a dying condition. Later in the morning he announced to his friends that he was feeling much better and asked that his brother be called as he wished to speak to him. As the brother did not respond immediately, Mr. Amos rose from his bed, and after dressing himself, went to the brother's home, a distance of several hundred yards. He walked with the assistance of his cane, and without the use of his cane. Neighbors gathered at the Amos home and expected to see the patient die in a few minutes. On the contrary, he claimed to be feeling perfectly well. Mr. Amos has been perfectly well since that time, and the attending physicians diagnosed as cancer of the stomach. When talked to yesterday evening, Mr. Amos said that he was satisfied as he did at should keep feeling as he did at that time, but should the respite from suffering be a symptom of the end, he was also ready to face the issue. Hundreds of people have called at the home in the

past few days and are completely mystified as to what caused the sudden change.
