KEYSTONE STATE QUARTERBACK TO JOIN GRID SQUAD

Young Phenom From Erie High School Will Try for Varsity Eleven.

MORGANTOWN, Aug. 11.—I. Benton Bush, Jr., the sensational quarterback of the Erie, Pa. High School eleven last fall, is the first "outsider" product to make known to local athletic authorities that he expects to enter West Virginia this year. Although Pennsylvania bred, young Bush is of West Virginia stock and is now living in this state and when he registers here it will be from Charleston.

West Virginia fans may not know it but Erie established a record last year that compares favorably with the showing of the Great Harrisburg Tech outfit in 1919, when Carl Beck was the whole show there. A glance at the records show that Erie won all of its eleven games, by virtue of which it was able to claim and receive the championship of northwestern Pennsylvania and western New York, including Buffalo and surrounding cities.

It ever a quarterback was well-trained it is Bush, who worked for three whole years under "Doc" Anderson, the famous all-American quarterback from Colgate. Anderson, it is said, took a particular interest in Bush who he claims is one of the most finished quarters to graduate from scholastic ranks.

I. Benton Bush, Sr., is a West Virginia graduate of the class of 1900 and a classmate of Roy Yoke the present alumni secretary. It is through Yoke that the announcement is made that Bush intends to enter here.

Young Bush weighs 165 pounds and is very fast. He is under the management of their old first baseman, Lawrence Pyles.
