PURCELL FUNERAL TO BE ON MONDAY

Services Will Be Held From Catholic Church Beginning at 9 a. m.

The funeral of Daniel Thomas Purcell, whose death occurred yesterday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Mary A. Kennedy on Locust avenue extension, will be held at 9 o'clock Monday morning from St. Peter's Catholic Church and burial will be made in Holy Cross Cemetery.

Mr. Purcell had been in declining health for several months and had been in a serious condition for the past several days.

He was born at Mount Pleasant, Fayette County, Pa., on December 9, 1881, and was the son of the late James and Mary Purcell. He was left an orphan at an early age. On October 7, 1913, he was married to Miss Ellen B. Kennedy, daughter of Mrs. Mary A. Kennedy and the late Michael Kennedy, and he has survived by his wife and three children, Rosemary, Sarah Alice and James Kennedy.

He is also survived by three brothers and two sisters. For many years he was employed in and about the mines of Pennsylvania, Maryland and West Virginia, and had held the position as mine superintendent with the Split Coal and Coke Co. at Adrian, W. Va. His work kept him from this city a good deal and his family had resided at the Kennedy home.
