The End There is one thing it probably would be well to insert here—since we arrived in California I have seen a gentleman who saw the quarrel between M. Beal and L. Bosley on the 12th of June which you will recall was spoken of on the 3rd of July. It appears that Mr. Beal and Mr. Bosley were traveling together in the same wagon with four mules

On the morning of the 11th of June the train they were traveling with concluded to lay up. Mr. Bosley wished to travel on but Mr. Beal wished to wait upon their mules. In Mr. Bosley caught up two of the mules and said he would go on. Mr. Beal took it coldly and Mr. Bosley and the boys started toward and came to the fir grove which you will observe is spoken of in the evening the train started and drove within a half mile of the grove.
