THE STRIKE. Seems to Have Centered in Brooklyn, a Suburb of Cleveland. WAR AMONG THE MAYORS. Officers in the Suburbs do Not Like the Usurpation of Power by Mayor Farley of Cleveland—Soldiers Not Allowed to Get Water in the Suburbs—Strikers Still Riotous.

Cleveland, July 26.—The storm center of the street railway strike has according to the authorities, settled in Brooklyn, a suburb connected with Cleveland by a long, high bridge. At noon 150 employees of the Boro Steel Range company blocked a car on the bridge and dragged the motorman and conductor from their posts, inflicting with their fists and other weapons injuries more painful than serious. Soldiers on guard at the barn about a half mile away hurried to the scene but the rioters had taken refuge in the factory which stands under the approach to the bridge. The factory was surrounded and the premises searched but there was no clew by which the guilty ones could be traced.
