ST. ALBANS.

William C. Robie has been appointed immigrant inspector at the local port to succeed Charles S. Forbes, who resigned to become postmaster. Mr. Robie has resigned his position as customs inspector and assumed his new duties Monday.

In connection with the announcement that milk furnished a Boston contractor by about 30 farmers near St. Albans has been shut out by order of the Boston board of health, the report that aliphtheria was prevalent here seems to be without foundation. Health Officer Arthur Morton denies that any cases have been reported to him.

The school census of the city of St. Albans, taken under the direction of City Clerk R. M. Hopkins, shows 1,566 children of school age, five to 18 years. There are 755 girls and 750 boys. The report shows that there are 319 children between the ages of five and eight, 597 from eight to 12 years, and 272 between the ages of 12 and 18.

Walter Labadie and Frank West, the young boys who were arrested about 10 days ago on the charge of burglary, were in city court Saturday and pleaded guilty to the charge. Labadie was sentenced to not less than four nor more than five years in State prison at Windsor, and West was sentenced to the State reformatory at Vermont for the remainder of his minority. These are the boys who, it was discovered, had been breaking into summer cottages at St. Albans Bay and vicinity and helping themselves to various articles, about 25 places having been entered during the spring and early summer. They also broke into the theater on Main street and their arrest for this crime led to their disclosure of the remainder of their misdeeds.
