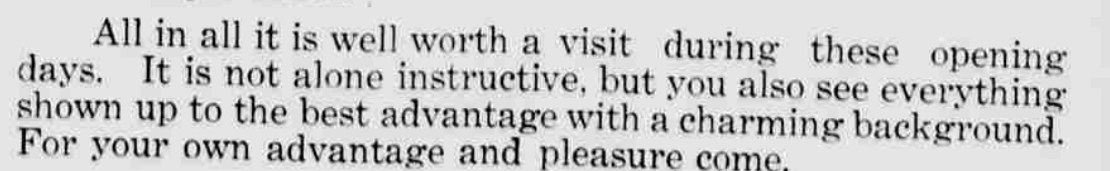

Boston—Massachusetts public service commission has suspended until November 1 proposed increases in mileage book rates from 2 to 2 1/4 cents by New Haven, Boston & Maine, Boston & Albany and Central Vermont railroads. A 1/4 cent increase will be held constant.
