HINESBURG.

John H. Allen, 78 years old, died at one o'clock Tuesday afternoon from the effects of a shock, after a few days illness. Mr. Allen was a resident of this town all his life, being born in the house in which he died. He is survived by his wife and five children, John C. of Montpelier, H. H. of C. Cassidy of Springfield, Mass., Mrs. A. L. Walker of Burlington, Mrs. C. L. Clifford of Brandon and Florence, living at home. Judge Allen was educated in the public schools of Hinesburg, People's Academy of Morrisville and at Wesleyan Academy, Ferrisburg, N. Y. He enlisted in the 14th Vermont regiment on September 5, 1862, and was appointed first lieutenant. He participated in the battle of Gettysburg. He was captain of Company H, Vermont National Guard, from 1872 to 1873. Judge Allen had been a life-long republican, representing Hinesburg in the Legislature of 1880. He was elected assistant judge of Chittenden county in 1890 and re-elected in 1902 and 1904. He was a member of the Sunday school, superintendent of the Sunday school, G. S. P. and A. M., was first commander of Cummins Post, No. 37, G. A. R., commander of Vermont commandery of the Royal Legion. Judge Allen was a man who possessed a remarkable personality, having the gift of making and holding friends, genial and generous to a fault. He was public-spirited, always standing for high ideals. In passing of Judge Allen removed a Christian gentleman, who has left an imprint on the hearts of his immediate family, but by the entire community. The funeral will be held to-day at the Baptist Church at 1:30 p. m.
