

AMERICAN GOODS IN NEUTRAL PORTS MAY BE RELEASED

Great Britain Prepared to Accept Informal Representations by Our State Department's Foreign Trade Advisers.

PLAN SOON FORMULATED

Goods of German and Austrian Manufacture Now Held at Rotterdam Alone Amount to \$167,000,000.

Washington, Sept. 7.—Details information was sent by Ambassador Francis London today that Great Britain is now prepared to accept informal representations by the foreign trade advisers of the state department as a means of releasing American owned goods of German and Austrian origin now held in neutral ports by the British order in council.

London, Sept. 7.—Details information was received by a conference attended by Trade Adviser Fleming, Mr. H. D. Brown, commercial attaché of the British embassy here, and T. B. Sherman, counsel for the importers' association, after which it was announced that the details of the plan will be worked out in the next few days.
